

#### Shearing To Get A Clean Fleece

Market Value of Wool Is Reduced by Dirt and Care-

The old saving "Sheep well shorn, fleeces well rolled and tied make their marketing easy and sure" is just as true to-day as i ever was. For many years the in portance of using feeding racks that keep sheep clean from seeds and chaff has been emphasized, so that there are now few farmers who do not realize the importance of a clean fleece on the back of the sheep. Shearing is the important step. The market value of woo time of shearing and even later by carelessness after shearing.

Shearing should be done on clean dry floor or platform. Sheep should not be shorn after a rain, as a fleece that is rolled when damp is likely to become discolour ed and flat after being packed. on local shearers. It is important to secure the services of a shear-er who shears closely and evenly, and one who handles the sheep so be evenly and properly rolled and tied. The fleece should be rolled with the flesh side out.






