Canada Holds First Place Supplying Wheat and Cats to United Kingdom

Canada held first place in supply Production by some scientifical ing several leading commodities to the United Kingdom market in the month of April, according to a rade report released by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics. Canada was first in the British market with wheat, supplying 2,-496,811 cwt, and cats with 69,003 cwt., and also led in wheat meal and flower, contributing 324,321


