He explained the method of cutting and handling lumber so that not too much will be added to the cost of the finished product. ## ROBT. J. McCUTCHEON

The community was saddened last Saturday, when it became known that Robert John McCutcheon, a lifelong resident of the Relessey District, had passed away in Lord Dufferin hospital. The late Mr. McCutcheon was the youngest son of the late James McCutcheon, one of the early pioneers of Mono township. He was born on November 18th, 1871, on lot 21, con. 5, east, Mono, and had lived his entire life-time in that community. He was an active member of Relessey United Church and was for many years a prominent member of the Orange Order. Mr. McCutcheon had been in failing health for the past few months. On July 2nd he suffered a paralytic stroke, while attending a Junior Farmers' service at Woodside Park and was taken to Lord Dufferin hospital, where he lingered for six weeks and finally succumbed to a heart attack.

The funeral was held from his late home on Monday afternoon, with Rev. T. V. Hart of Camilla in charge of the services, assisted by deceased's nephew, Rev. A. H. Halbert of Newtonbrook, who also sang a solo, "I Want to go there". Rev. Hart spoke very highly of the deceased and his influence in the home and community. The funeral was very largely attended and bore witness to the high esteem in which Mr. McCutcheon was held where he was best known.

## Reduction of Fire Insurance Rates in British Columbia

In contra-distinction to the cost of most commodities today, the price of fire insurance has steadily declined during the past ten years from 90c per \$100 to 69c, and now word comes from Vancouver, that due to the very favorable loss record on general business experienced in that City over the past few years, a reduction of rates has become effective as from August first, which will, it is estimated, bring about a saving of approximately \$200,000 per annum in fire insurance premiums to the citizens. This is one of the largest reductions ever put into effect in the province.

Not only have the rates been reduced in Vancouver, but other cities and towns in the Province have benefited by reduced rates.

This direct saving to the public is the result of an exhaustive and close study, which has been undertaken by the British Columbia Underwriters' Association over a period of many years, and the carrying out of their recommendations for better construction and more efficient methods of safeguarding hazards, and the taking of adequate measures of fire protection to minimize probable loss features. To accomplish this satisfactory outcome, has involved a great deal of work on the part of the Association, and necessitated the expenditure of large sums of money on the part of the Board Companies, but it has undoubtedly resulted in the diminution of loss of life and property.
