Holland Centre, September 5th, 1939

Council met on the above date for the transaction of Township business. All members of Council were present and the Reeve, Geo. Hanna, Esq., presided.

The minutes of the previous meeting were read and confirmed. Correspondence was read as follows: Dept. of Education re High Schools; Dept. of Education re Township School areas; Welfare Dept. City of Toronto; Welfare Dept. City of Owen Sound; Markdale Agricultural Society re grant.

Live stock claims as follows were received from the valuers and the Treasurer authorized to make payment: William Buchanan, one lamb killed, \$8.25; William Erwin, valuing, \$1.60.

Relief accounts to the total of \$122.35 were received and passed. Buchanan - Dixon—That the usual grants be given to Agricultural Societies this year, namely Chatsworth, Markdale and Walters Falls.—Carried.

Dixon - Buchanan—That the Road Superintendent's Pay Sheet No. 8, amounting to \$120.48, be passed and the Treasurer issue cheques for the same.—Carried.

Sutcliffe - Buchanan—That Finance Statement No. 5, amounting to \$193.91, be passed as read and the Treasurer be authorized to issue cheques for the same.—Carried.

Council then adjourned until Tuesday, Oct. 3rd, at 1 p.m. H. V. WALES, Clerk
