After an illness of three weeks in the Owen Sound hospital, Burton Charles Bellamy, 18 year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. C. J. Bellamy, passed away early Friday morning, after a most gallant fight from a relapse following an operation for appendicitis. Burton went to the hospital on August 29th and had the operation that afternoon. Hopes for his complete recovery were held out for some time but he gradually grew weaker and despite five blood transfusions he passed away about 12.45 Friday morning.

Burton was of a quiet disposition and was popular with all. His hobby was airplanes, and he was a master in designing and flying gliders around his home. He was extremely clever that way and took a keen interest in aeronautics. In his home is a splendid model of the Santa Maria, full rigged, that Burton built and which showed the care and exactness in the work he undertook. He was a clean-living boy and was a member of St. John's United Church, of which he was a regular attendant and was also in attendance at Sunday School each Sunday. He was a student at the Flesherston high school and took high splendid marks at the June examinations, taking all his subjects.

Besides his grief stricken parents, Burton is survived by two brothers, Robert of Winona and Benny at home. The funeral was held on Sunday afternoon with service in St. John's United Church, which was filled to capacity with sympathizing friends of the family. The service was conducted by Rev. G. K. McMillan, pastor of St. John's Church, assisted by Rev. A. R. Muir of Priceville. Rev. McMillan preached a comforting sermon and referred to the Christian character of Burton and the interest he took in religion. His message was very comforting to the bereaved parents. Interment was made in the family plot in Flesherston cemetery, where Rev. McMillan was again assisted by Rev. Muir.

Testament for Troops

Commended by the King

The board of the Upper Canada Bible Society Auxiliary, meeting this week, unanimously adopted the proposal of the British and Foreign Bible Society to provide pocket editions of the New Testament for the use of military forces. All Canadians enlisting for service, before leaving for overseas service, will receive a New Testament bound in khaki with the coat-of-arms on the cover and containing a message from the King.

"To all serving in my forces by sea or land or air, and indeed to all my people engaged in the defense of the realm, I commend the reading of this book." The King's message reads.

"For centuries the Bible has been a wholesome and strengthening influence in our national life. It behooves us to turn with renewed faith to this divine source of comfort and inspiration."

During the Great War a total of 9,000,000 copies of the New Testament were distributed among the military forces of the world. Nearly 500,000 were presented to Canadian soldiers, stated Rev. J. B. M. Armour, general secretary of the British and Foreign Bible Society in Canada and Newfoundland.

SHOP IN MARKDALE.

Revised Way to Knit Socks

A new list of instructions has been issued by the Canadian Red Cross Society for knitting socks and copies are available from Red Cross headquarters to all groups now engaged in supplying war necessities. The new directions read:

Please make a wearable sock, pressing or using stretchers. Length of foot when finished, 11 inches. Four and three-quarters ounces of 4-ply fingering. Needles: No. 11, by Bell gauge.

Cast on 60 stitches, rib 4 inches, 2 plain, 2 purl. Knit 7 inches (11 in all). Heel: Knit plain 28 stitches onto one needle, turn, purl back these 28 stitches, turn, knit plain. Repeat these two rows (always slipping the first stitch) 11 times (12 in all), or 24 rows.

With the inside of the heel toward you, purl 15 stitches, slip 1, purl 1, pull slipped stitch over, purl 1. Turn, knit 4 stitches, slip 1, knit 1, pull slipped stitch over, knit 1, turn, purl 5 stitches, slip 1, purl 1, pull slipped stitch over, purl 1. Turn, knit 6 stitches, slip 1, knit 1, pull slipped stitch over, knit 1. Turn, purl 7 stitches, slip 1, purl 1, pull slipped stitch over, purl 1. Turn, knit 8 stitches, slip 1, knit 1, pull slipped stitch over, knit 1, turn, purl 9 stitches, slip 1, purl 1, pull slipped stitch over, purl 1. Turn, knit 10 stitches, slip 1, knit 1, pull slipped stitch over, knit 1. Turn, purl 11 stitches, slip 1, purl 1, pull slipped stitch over, purl 1. Turn, knit 12 stitches, slip 1, knit 1, pull slipped stitch over, knit 1. Turn, purl 13 stitches, slip 1, knit 1, pull slipped stitch over, purl 1. Turn, knit 14 stitches, slip 1, knit 1, pull slipped stitch over, knit 1.

Pick up and knit the 12 stitches down the side of the heel piece and knit two stitches off the front of the needle. Knit the 28 stitches off the front needles onto one needle, the last two stitches knit onto the third needle on which pick up and knit the 12 stitches at the other side of the heel piece. Divide the heel stitches onto the 2 side needles and knit right around again to the centre heel. First needle, knit to within 3 stitches of the front end of the side needle, slip 1, knit 1, pull slipped stitch over, knit 1.

Front needle plain. Third needle, knit 1, skip 1, knit 1, pull slipped stitch over, knit plain to the end of the needle. This reducing to be done every other row until there are 56 stitches on the needles (front needle 28, side needles 14 each). Knit plain until the foot from the back of the heel measures 9 inches.

Kitchener Toe: Decrease for toe. Knit 6 stitches, slip 1, knit 1, pull slipped stitch over, knit 6 stitches, slip 1, knit 1, pull slipped stitch over. Repeat this around the three needles. Then knit 6 rows plain, knit 5 stitches, slip 1, knit 1, pull slipped stitch over, and repeat round the three needles. Then 4 plain rows, knit 3, overslip 1, knit 1, pull slipped stitch over, repeat to end of three needles, then 2 plain, knit 1, slip 1, knit 1, pull slipped stitch over, repeat to end of 3 needles. Then 1 plain row, then 1 row, decreasing, if necessary, so as to leave 7 stitches on front needle and 4 on each of the back needles. Knit the back stitch on to 1 needle. Break off the wool, leaving about 10 stitches. Thread this into a darning needle, put through the first stitch on front needle as if for purling, but do not take the stitch off. Then put the darning needle through the first stitch on the back needles, as if for purling, and take off.

*Then through next stitch on back needle, as if for knitting, and do not take off. Then through the first stitch on front needle, again knitting and slip off. Through the second stitch on front needle, purling and do not take off. Through the first stitch on back needle purling and take off. Repeat from * until all the stitches are worked off. N.B.—Each stitch must be gone through twice, except the first and last on back needles. Always keep the wool under the knitting needles. When reducing, it is better to slip 1 and pull the slipped stitch over instead of taking two together. In finishing off end of yarn, run yarn once down the toe so as not to make a ridge or lump.

Alternate Toe: Decrease for toe. On front needle knit 2, slip 1, pass slip stitch over. Knit to within 4 stitches from end of needle. Knit 2 stitches together, knit 2. On first side knit 2, slip 1, knit 1, pass slip stitches over. Knit to end of needle. Knit to within 4 stitches from end of second side needle, knit 2 together, knit 3. Knit around plain. Repeat these two rows until there are 10 stitches on front needle and 5 on each of side needles. Now slip stitches from one side needle to the other, making 10 stitches on 2 needles. Break wool. This latter toe is favored by many experienced knitters.
