Canada is preparing slowly and surely for an effective part in the Empire's War. Nothing is being done in a makeshift way.

From the Rhine to the Danube from the Baltic to the Black Sea, the nations gaze with varying degrees of fear and trembling upon the legions

which devastated Poland. That unhappy country was partitioned again this week, Germany and Russia dividing it between them. The end of the Eastern campaign freed German armies for service elsewhere. red to aid in the defence of the West wall, but it is doubtful if the German staff can make use of all the troops available, because fortifications can hold only a limited number of men.

The question arises. What will Hitler do with the surplus troops and material? Holland and Belgium became

frightened when German troops were being concentrated at Aachen, as this is a convenient place from which to invade the Netherlands, and both countries took prompt measures to repel any such attack Switzerland also became anxious over German activities along her borders.
