## University Sorts Indian Remains

Relics Found by Archaeological Expedition at Clearville, Ont., Will Be Shown In London, Ont., Museum Work has begun at the Univer-

sity of Western Ontario, London, on sorting and classification of several thousand Indian relics and carbonized vegetable remnants found by the university's archaeological survey party near Clear ville, Ont., this summer. Wilfrid Jury, curator of the university museum and Professor of the largest private Indian collection in Canada, will be in charge of the estim ated six months' task. The collection consists of lifty nacking cases filled with an assort-

ment of bones, flints, stone tools, ornamental slates and carbonized remnants of corn. beans and also squash. Mr. Jury said the finding shed considerable light on hitherto unknown Indian occupations.

Bones, Flints, Tools, Vegetables "The Clearville site was the first we have found in which there was distinct evidence of three separate


