THE WEEK AT WAR

Neither side has attempted major drive on the Western Front but German attacks drove French outposts back from some of their advanced positions. Later French counter attacks regained some of the lost ground, but on balance it appears that the enemy made some headway in regaining a little of the ground lost to the French earlier in the war. It must be remembered that the Maginot and Siegfried Lines are miles apart, and the intervening "no man's land" is where the fighting is taking place.

One reason given for the comparative quiet is that Germany is short new leader or 1 organist, Mr. Buzza, of gasoline.
