Biologist Believes These Appendages Have Definite Value

The medical fraternity has long been in doubt about the value of tonsils, says the St. Thomas Times Journal. One viewpoint is that they are useless, because they have no function in the body and frequent-ly become infected, causing a variety of troubles. The other view-point is that they do perform some useful function, the nature of which has not as yet been definitely determined, Dr. I. S. Pohl, a Berlin biologist, reports experimental work on animals which indicate that the tonsils have an endocrin gland function and that they contribute a hormone that aids in the growth. Using fish and salamand ers as experimental subjects, he fed one group of each with dried substance from the tonsils of hogs. and control groups were given the same material after they were al treated with X-rays. Another set of control groups were given drie tissues of the spleen of hogs. He






