LIVE STOCK MARKET REPORT by DUNN & LEVACK, TORONTO

About 4000 cattle arrived for Monday's market, and the trade was active for good butcher cattle and choice steers up to twelve hundred pounds. While weighty steers were slow, canners and cutters sold a quarter lower, but good cows held steady. Selected stockers and feeders were in good demand, but medium kind slow. Lambs held strong at from 9.75 to 10.00 and sheep were better. Calves were active and steady. Hogs about 10 cents higher. Choice weighty steers brought from 7.60 to 7.80, fair to good from 6.50 to 7.00. Choice butcher steers and heifers sold at from 6.75 to 7.25 with some extra choice at 7.50, fair to good kind from 6.25 to 6.75, common to medium 5.00 to 6.00. Choice baby heaves held steady at from 8.00 to 9.00, plain kind 6.50 to 7.50. Selected stockers 6.25 to 6.75, fair to good 5.50 to 6.00, common 4.75 to 5.25. Choice heifery cows were steady at from 5.00 to 5.50, choice fat cows 4.25 to 4.75, fair to good 3.50 to 4.00. Light bulls brought from 4.00 to 4.25, and heavy bologna bulls 1500 pounds and over sold at from 4.75 to 5.00. Choice lambs brought from 9.75 to 10.00 and the sheep trade was strong, best kind selling from 5.00 to 6.00. Calves were in good demand, choice from 10.00 to 10.50, with a few fancy calves at 11.00. Fair to good from 8.50 to 9.50; common to medium 6.00 to 7.50. The hog market was active and strong, with truck deliveries selling mostly at 8.90 alive, filled weights and rail graded from 11.90 to 12.00.
