Former Teacher Dies Suddenly At Winnipeg

Miss Susan C. Irwin, of 36 C Rivington Mansions, former member of the St. John's Technical high school staff, died Tuesday following a brief illness. Miss Irwin was domestic science teacher at St. John's for many years, retiring in 1934. Since her retirement she had spent a year in extensive travelling, and since her return to Winnipeg had become a successful writer. She was a member of the Women's University Club and the Winnipeg branch of the Canadian Women's Press Club.

Miss Irwin was born at Markdale, Ont., and received her early education there. She graduated from the Ontario Agricultural College, home economics department, at Guelph, Ontario. Later she took a special course at Columbia University. Miss Irwin was awarded a degree by the University of Chicago.

Survivors include three brothers, Alex. D. of Warton, Ont., William A. of the University of Chicago staff and Harry C. of Winnipeg; three sisters, Miss Florence E. of Winnipeg, Mrs. James McKerracher of Northwood, Ont., and Mrs. J. R. Armstrong of Markdale, Ont.; and two nieces, Misses Mary and Alice Tolson, who made their home with Miss Irwin. Funeral service was held on Thursday afternoon at the A. B. Gardiner chapel, with burial in Brookside cemetery. Rev. E. M. Howse and Prof. Fletcher Argue officiated, and the pallbearers were George King, J. P. Duffin, G. J. Reeve, G. P. R. Tallin, Walter Fleming and S. E. Buckler.

The death of Mrs. John Fawcett of Stayner occurred in the G. and M. Hospital, Collingwood, Wednesday night, Dec. 13th and came as a great shock to her many friends and relatives, although she had not been in good health for the past year.

Five weeks ago she was suddenly taken very ill. Her relatives were called to her bedside, but she rallied and in a week's time was able to be removed to her sister's home, Mrs. W. T. Lyons, in Stayner, where she was nursed and lovingly cared for. Then on Dec. 4th she was taken to the Collingwood hospital for an operation for gall stones. Everything was done to save her life, but she passed peacefully away nine days after the operation due to heart failure.

The late Mrs. Fawcett was born February 1st, 1881, Laura Jane Bowler, a daughter of the late Joshua and Marie Bowler of Markdale. She was married 41 years ago to John A. Fawcett, and they resided around Markdale until later years when they kept store at Brentwood and about ten months ago moved to Stayner where they have since made their home.
