Found on Site of Neutral Inc ian Village in Brant County -Reported to be Unique - Is Made of Antier

Excavations on the site of what was once a large Neutral Indian village on the Kemp Farm in Onondaga Township, Brant County, have resulted in a discovery which informed sources term "a rare find," an ancient ceremonial pipe made in the shape of a crane's head from the antler of a deer and probably four centuries old The specimen, measuring seven inches in length, carries out it likeness to a bird's head by markings of eyes, ears and beak open ng, while the hole for the stem is at the base of the neck.


