Thieves Slug Constable and Rob Store

Three cold-blooded criminals made off with \$4.500 worth of goods from event in Markdale on Saturday, ing as his theme "Boys Clubs". Petch was making his rounds at about 3 a.m. when he noticed a car parked at Main and Owen Sound streets. He walked up to the auto and one of three men in the machine asked where gasoline could be bought. Just as the constable was a bout to reply he was dealt a stunning blow from behind. It was later found he had suffered a skull gash four inches long and an inch deep.
