> Best yielding varieties were another factor in increasing yields. Vanguard and Erban were specially stressed as they are resistant to rust. Either are good. The Erban is resistant to leaf rust, whereas the Vanguard is resistant to stem rust.

In order that the best seed is saved, the use of fanning mills was Alex. McTaggart, at Berkeley, early stressed. Many are to be found on the farms in Ontario, but unfortunately some have been left unused bewas well and favorably known in cause the screens have become badly rusted or broken. In many districts large power seed cleaning plants are installed. These are owned by Agricultural Societies, Co-operative organizations or private individuals.
