Mr. Thomas Merrer, one of the best knows residents of this place, passed away at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Ellerby Farr, at Weston on Saturday morning, April 13th, following an illness of several months he had been gradually growing weaker. Last fall he disposed of his effects by auction and since that time had been with his daughters at Palmerston and Weston.
