The Seed Fair

On Friday of last week the first Annual Seed Fair was held, under the auspices of the Grey County Crop and Soil Improvement Association.

There were 74 entries brought in by 24 exhibitors. The quality of the exhibits was exceptionally high as indicated by the price when the 5 and 10 bushel lots of Erban and Vanguard Oats and Nobar Barley were sold by auction with Auctioneer Otto Johann, Owen Sound, wielding the hammer. The prices ranged from 80¢ to \$1.02 per bushel.

Winners came from the townships of Derby, Keppel, Glenelg, Sydenham, Sullivan and Sarawak.

During the afternoon Professors R. J. Bryden and A. W. Mason of the Ontario Agricultural College, Guelph gave talks on Soil Fertility and Seed and Mr. John D. MacLeod, Acting Director of the Crops, Seeds and Weeds branch, spoke on Seed Cleaning. Almost one hundred farmers attended the meeting.

Road Committee Suggests Help With Connecting Links

As the result of the discussion in an earlier session of the County Council regarding the expenses of keeping county connecting links within the villages of Neustadt and Shallow Lake in a proper state of repair, a clause regarding this was included in the report of the County Roads Committee, brought before the Grey County Council at their closing session Saturday morning. The report was submitted by Reece D. J. MacDonald of Bentinck and it recommended that an agreement be prepared between the County and the villages of Neustadt and Shallow Lake regarding connecting links and that these be presented to the Council at the June session.

In the cases of these two villages the County rebate is not sufficient to repair the rather lengthy connecting links, and it was felt that some agreement by which the county should assist would be only fair.

The report stated that several small bridges and culverts would be constructed throughout the county this year, but as the committee had not had an opportunity to properly inspect the roads this year yet, no definite announcements regarding this work could be given. It was expected that the same amount of calcium chloride would be used this year as last, and it was reported that six steel bridges would require repainting this year.

Odd Fellows To Engage In Benevolent Work

At the regular meeting of Saugeen Lodge No. 327, I.O.O.F., held Monday evening a new set of by-laws were adopted. A new section has been added which gives the lodge authority to engage in community benevolent work. The members of the local institution have had a desire to do some of this work for some time but had no authority to provide funds for such but now they may hold bazaars, social evenings or other such functions to raise money for this work. Donations may be made to this fund by those desiring to assist. It is the intention of the members to supplement the activities of the local Rotary Club in community welfare work but not to duplicate in any way. The officers will be glad to receive suggestions from the public as to methods for raising funds.

County To Pay Share of Memorial Expenses

Grey County Council will pay its share of the balance owing in connection with accounts of the Grey County Memorial Fund. It was decided by that body at their Saturday morning session. Although the scheme for building a Peace Memorial has been temporarily suspended due to war conditions, some expenses had been incurred and it is necessary that these be paid.

Grey County's share is fixed at \$110.60 and the County have agreed to pay this provided that the City of Owen Sound is willing to pay the same amount.

Announcement of this was included in the report of the finance committee, brought before the Saturday morning session by Reece Austin E. Ball of Hanover, chairman of that body. The report also recommended payment of accounts for committee members' service.

School Children's Excursion

To the Teachers of South Grey: You will recall that at the Teachers' Convention last fall it was arranged that there should be an excursion for grades 7, 8, 9, and 10, in both Public and Separate Schools, to Niagara Falls, the event to take place about the middle of May, when the blossoms would be at their best throughout the Niagara district.

In order that the committee in charge may make preliminary arrangements this letter is sent out for your information, and also to obtain information that details may be worked out. Another letter will follow this in due time.

Will you have the kindness to write me not later than April 18th and answer the following questions as well as you can:

1. How many children in the above grades have you on the roll?
2. How many would be able to pay 50 cents for the return ticket?
3. How many cars would be available from your section?
4. Would those cars hold all from your section who wish to go?
5. Would there be room for other children from other sections in the cars from your section? How many?

The date of the excursion is not yet fixed, but word will be sent you later about this.

The suggested route is as follows: From all points of the Inspectorate to Arthur, then by route 6 to Ferguson, Guelph and Hamilton, where a stop will be made to visit the great market. From Hamilton the best route is via route No. 8 through Winona, Grimsby, Beamsville, St. Catharines, St. David's, to Queensville village, where the children will receive Laura Secord's old home, then to Queenston Heights and Brock's Monument, then to the Whirlpool, and on to the Great Cataract, where the children will eat lunch and be photographed. The above will take about six hours, hence drivers should leave their home school about six in the morning.

Children will bring two lunches, one for noon and the other for supper, which will be eaten en route home.

Children who wish to do so may cross the bridge to the American side, but this will cost each child ten cents for a return ticket. Several teachers will go with the party.

Many details cannot be given in this letter, but the committee in charge will spare no pains to make the event pleasurable and profitable.

Federation of Agriculture

Last Saturday the farmers of Grey County had presented to them the why and wherefore of a non-political organization which will be known as the Federation of Agriculture. The objects are to co-ordinate the efforts of agricultural organizations and different branches of agriculture within the county; to act as a county unit of the Federation of Agriculture and to co-operate with similar organizations throughout Ontario in furthering the rural interests; to assist in formulating and promoting county, provincial and national, international agricultural policies to meet changing economic conditions.

The special speakers were Hon. P. M. Dewan, B.S.A., Minister of Agriculture, Mr. Roy Stewart, President of the Barrie Tanning Company, Dr. W. M. Drummond, Professor of Agricultural Economics, O.A.C., Guelph and Mr. H. H. Hannam, President Canadian Chamber of Agriculture, and all members of parliament.

Hon. P. M. Dewan, who spoke on the subject "The need for an efficient rural organization", emphasized the necessity for farmers joining together in an effort to better their conditions.

Mr. R. A. Stewart, President of the Barrie Tanning Company, pointed out the "Benefits derived by Big Business from Co-operation". He showed the results by giving a most enlightening address. Farmers were advised to get together and endeavor to secure some of the better things their industry was entitled to.

Dr. Drummond gave a most thoughtful address on the subject "After the war; What?" He pointed to the competition which certainly would be greater after the war than now so it behooved the rural people to grow the best, grade it well now so the products of Canadian farms would command a position in the markets of the world.

The last speaker was Mr. H. H. Hannam, B.S.A., president of the Canadian Chamber of Agriculture. He stressed the idea that farmers were having no voice in formulating agricultural policies which affected marketing quotas, tariff revisions, etc. were not submitted for his opinion. The admonition to follow the lead of the industries was urged upon everyone present. Mr. Hannam thought another meeting should be held at Durham.

Over 150 Grey County farmers attended the morning session and twice that number listened in the afternoon. Impassable roads prevented a larger meeting but sufficient were present to carry the message to all parts of the County.

During the summer it is proposed to organize every township by holding a meeting at some central point, to which the farmers will be invited. Only a provisional organization was attempted. A permanent set of officers will be selected by the farmers in the townships from which the County Executive will be taken.

The one problem before every farmer is to devise means of raising finances to carry on the work of the new organization. That the rural people must provide such is an undisputable fact. Everyone must help and every farmer in Grey must become associated with their Grey County Federation of Agriculture. Their efforts will be watched with interest and it is hoped with success.

590,000 Trees To Be Planted By Grey Farmers

Grey County's reforestation project is moving ahead by leaps and bounds. When the report of the Reforestation Committee was presented to the County Council on Saturday morning, Chairman John McGillivray of Durham announced that 590,000 trees would be ordered for individual planting throughout the county, and 32,000 for schools.

His report stated that arrangements had been made for free distribution of trees to all schools, individuals or groups applying for them to the Forestry Branch. The trees to be delivered at Thornbury, Neaford, Owen Sound, Chatsworth, Holland Centre, Markdale, Flesherston, Dundalk, Durham and Holstein.

Thomas Mercer Passed Away On Saturday

Mr. Thomas Mercer, one of the best known residents of this place, passed away at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Ellerby Farr, at Weston on Saturday morning, April 13th, following an illness of several months. During the past twelve months he had been gradually growing weaker. Last fall he disposed of his effects by auction and since that time had been with his daughters at Palmerston and Weston. About a month ago he returned to Markdale and remained here until Thursday before his passing when he went to Weston.

The deceased was born in Erin township, near Hillsburg, on July 26th, 1867. As a child he came with his parents and settled on a farm in Artemesia east of Markdale. Here he grew to manhood and farmed most successfully on the East Backline. During his younger days he was an importer of horses and on several occasions visited Scotland for the purpose of purchasing animals. He was also a breeder of Shorthorn cattle and was known in almost all parts of Canada. He shipped horses and cattle to the western provinces and was a prize winner at many fairs and exhibitions. About fifteen years ago he disposed of his splendid farm property on the East Backline and purchased the Douglas farm in the village which he continued to operate until the spring of 1939 when he was compelled to retire because of ill health.

Tom Mercer may have had his faults but he had more good qualities than most of us. He was of a sympathetic nature and no person in time of need ever appealed to him in vain. He enjoyed helping the other fellow more than any other person whom he has known. It was his nature to be helpful and this characteristic dominated his life to the end. He spread sunshine and his memory will remain green in the community for years to come.

For years he was active in the work of Markdale Agricultural Society and was honored a few years ago by being made a life member. A member of the local Orange Lodge, the Royal Black Knights and the Odd Fellows' Lodge he assisted for years in the work of these institutions.

His wife, before her marriage Prudence Ann Fleisher, passed away eleven years ago. Surviving are four daughters and two sons, namely: Viola, Mrs. J. S. Shepherdson, of Kingston; Leta, Mrs. Ellerby Farr, of Weston; Miss Mary Mercer in Toronto; Bessie, Mrs. N. L. Milne, of Palmerston; Wallace and Norman in Brockville. Two sisters, Mrs. E. A. Brown at Rosedale, B.C., and Mrs. Wm. Woolner of Winnipeg, also survive.

The funeral was held on Monday to Markdale cemetery. The remains were brought from Weston by motor and the service was held in Annesley United Church with Rev. S. E. Anns in charge.
