The funeral services of the late Mrs. Ezra Cook held at the home of her son, Mr. Carl Cook, last Wednesday, were very largely attended by sorrowing friends and neighbors. Rev. A. A. She was born and grew up to womanhood on the farm now owned by Mr. Harman Cook and was married there to the late Ezra Cook, who predeceased her about twenty-seven years ago. She was one of the best-loved and most esteemed women of the township of Euphrasia. During her 55 years of life here she has played such a worthy part in acting as a friend in homes of sickness and sorrow, that countless homes mourn to-day with the members of her family. Always alert and eager to keep in touch with church and community activities she leaves a vacancy that it is felt can never be filled. A very familiar figure in the village has been taken, a loved voice is stilled. Mrs. Cook was a member of Victoria United Church, a life-member of the W.M.S. and one of the first members of Rocklyn W.I. Mrs. Cook was adept at needlework and many beautiful quilts from her hands have found their way to W.M.S. bales or Institute needs. Only a few weeks ago a beautifully patched quilt top was presented by her to the Institute for Red Cross work.

Mrs. Cook has suffered several bereavements in past years and these were bravely borne by this pioneer woman. Her son, Elgin, was instantly killed blasting dynamite in British Columbia. Her son, Fred, who served overseas and was a victim of gas, succumbed to pneumonia while a patient in Christie St. hospital. In June Mrs. Cook would have celebrated her 85th birthday.

Left to mourn the loss of a devoted mother is her son Carl, with whom she resided, a daughter, Mabel, Mrs. B. Abercrombie of Strongfield, Sask. and Done, Mrs. W. N. Artley of Meaford, and two granddaughters, Margaret, Mrs. Carman Lougheed of Thornbury and Florence Artley of Meaford.

The deep sympathy of the community goes out to the family in their sad loss.
