

Thousands of child refugees from Britain, France and Allied countries will be brought to Canada just as soon as transportaernment announced at Ottawa following a conference of immigra-tion, health, welfare and Provincial authorities.

The movement to Canada will

be limited only by the Canadian ability to absorb the refugees, the British restrictions regarding classes living in the United King-dom and the matter of previding ransportation, it was stated. Canada's geographical proximity to the British Isles means that the refugee movement will be al-most exclusively to this Dominion. At the moment transportation difficulties make it virtually impossible to move the homeless to

Australia and New Zealand. ASKED TO OPEN HOMES An appeal is being made to the Canadian people to open their homes to the child refugees so that they can be given the best of care in the Dominion. The whole force of welfare organizations will be mobilized to look after them.


