

Study on Trade Relations Between Old and New World Says We Furnish Europe With 50 Per Cent or More of Raw Materials

Europe relies upon the Western Ismisphere as a source of raw materials more than this hemis phere depends upon Europe for its manifactured products, according to a study on trade relations between the Old World and the New released recently by Dr. Joseph Cenenbaum, chairman of the Joint Boycott Council of the Jewish La or Committee.
"The Western Hemisphore fur-

nished Europe with 50 per cent or more of its most important import-ed raw materials." Dr. Tenenbaum said, summarizing a study based on statistics gathered from official agencies of the various In 1938, the last full prewar year, North and South America

supplied Europe with 60 per cent of its imported cotton, 51 per cent of its imported copper, 63 per cen of its gasoline, 73 per cent of its corn, 76 per cent of its coffee, 45 per cent of its wheat. 63 of its bacco, the study found.

Italian Drive In Africa Aimed at Capturing Suez

THE WAR-WEEK-Commentary on Current Events

Italy's long-awaited attack on the I the Caucasus frontier. Such a move British in Africa came last week, giving the harrassed people of Briain something else to worry about besides an imminent German inva sion. Should Mussolini's legion succeed in their objectives, it was realized, Italy would gain a complete semi-circle of holdings that stretch from Tripoli to the middle of Africa's east coast, a strangle hold on the Suez Canal and an open road to India. Should Germany act successfully in concert with Italy, striking through the Balkans, the Axis powers would be in a position to seize the principal sources of the British oil supplies in the Near East, cut off the communicati

(The new southern war zone was seen to extend about 5,000 miles along the Mediterranean, the Red Sea and the Gulf of Aden, and hundreds of miles inland in the northeast and east corner of Africa, Spe cifically. Italy appeared to be striking at Egypt, through Libya; at British Somaliland, in a 3-prongadvance from Ethiopia; and at the vast interior regions of the Anglo-Egyptian Sudan and Kenya, agai approached from Ethiopia).

Included among the objectives the Krupp munitions plant at Es-sen, supply depots and airdromes in northwest Germany, the naval base at Kiel, air bases occupied by the Nazis in Holland and France. The planes bombed and machine gunned troops, truck and armored car columns and armored trains

Rumania Carved BALKANS: After twenty-sever years of territorial controversy, Ru-mania and Bulgaria were seen last week to be on the verge of reaching an agreement whereby Bulgaria would get back southern Dobruja. (Dobruja went to Rumania in 1913 after Bulgaria's defeat in the second Balkan war). 
