## Bible Society Meeting Held Sunday Evening

Rev. Walter McCleary B.A. of Elora, representative of the Canada Bible Society, spoke on Sunday evening in the Anglican Church at a union meeting of the churches, held after the regular evening services. There was a very good attendance, considering the almost incessant rain that fell.

In introducing his talk Mr. McCleary stated that throughout the war torn countries of Europe and especially in Germany and Italy sales of Bibles have during the past two years increased three or four fold. Russia is the only country which has barred the sale of Bibles. The society has supplied New Testaments to all our soldiers. Several thousands have been presented to them. Emphasizing the need of wholehearted support of the work of the society as there are more and more people asking for Bibles and looking toward its help and guidance.

Moving pictures on Africa were shown, tracing the missionary work of Stanley, his translation of some portions of Scripture into native tongue, its being sent to England to be printed and returned to Mr. Stanley for distribution to the natives.

Following the meeting the executive met and decided to go ahead with a canvass.

## Cigarettes For Our Boys Now Overseas

The members of Saugeen Lodge No. 327, I.O.O.F., Markdale have undertaken promotion of a plan whereby Canadian cigarettes and tobacco will be sent monthly to each of the local and community soldier boys now training in England. The idea is an excellent one, and has worked out with remarkable success in neighbouring towns and villages. Citizens will find on the counter of nearly every place of business in Markdale a container, together with a card explaining that if they will but drop their spare coppers, nickels, dimes or quarters in the containers, every cent will be used to send cigarettes and tobacco to overseas soldiers. These will be addressed to our own local boys, direct from the factory, and delivery is guaranteed. The cost is most favorable, with \$1 sending 300 cigarettes, while \$2.50 will send no less than 1000 cigarettes of any named brand.

So Mr. and Mrs. Citizen, when you see those jars on the counter of your favorite store, barber shop or service station, remember the boys in England, and drop in those spare pieces of small change. You will never miss it, and it will go a long way toward helping our soldiers. Not one penny of the collections so made will be used for a purpose other than the one outlined above.

## Mrs. T. R. McKenzie Passed Away Last Week

The sudden summons to her Eternal rest came peacefully to Mary Elizabeth Scott MacKenzie, widow of the late T. R. MacKenzie, in the early hours of Wednesday morning, Oct. 2nd, at her home on the Third Line, Artemesia, near Portlaw. Over a year ago Mrs. MacKenzie was taken ill, from which she never regained her formerly good health. She was never bedfast and a few hours before her call came she joined with some friends in singing some of the hymns she loved so well. Mrs. MacKenzie was of true Christian character and was very highly respected by all who knew her. She was a kind and understanding neighbour and friend, one who was always willing to help in any time of trouble.

Mrs. MacKenzie was born in Clark township, Durham County, in the year 1859. She was the eldest daughter of the late Andrew Carr and Joanna Scott. Over sixty years ago Mr. and Mrs. Carr with their family, moved to Flesherton district, where Mrs. MacKenzie was engaged in dress making. On August 5th, 1890, she was united in marriage to T. R. MacKenzie of Flesherton district, coming as a bride to her home near Portlaw, where she resided until her passing. At the time of morning to Flesherton, Mrs. MacKenzie joined the Presbyterian Church by certificate, later the Chalmers' Presbyterian Church and after union became a member of St. John's United Church, Flesherton. During her earlier life she was a member of the choir, a teacher in the Sunday School and was associated in young people's work in Chalmers' church, of which she was a faithful attendant. Even though she was always a member of the Flesherton church she gave unstinting of her talents in the local church at Mt. Zion. She was organist for 22 years and was still honorary organist. She was a special correspondent for the Women's Association the past two years, when her health did not permit her to help as she had in previous years. She wrote letters of sympathy to bereaved ones that contained beautiful thoughts and expressions. For a number of years she was a teacher in the Sunday School, also church treasurer. During the last war Mrs. MacKenzie was president of the local Red Cross Society. In her early married life she had given music lessons to a number of pupils.

Five years ago she was predeceased by her husband. Those who are left to mourn the loss of a devoted and loving mother are: Alvin at home and Lillian (Mrs. Herb. Walker) of Hatherton; one sister, Maggie (Mrs. John Cathcart) living at Souris, Man. She was predeceased by one sister, Aggie, in early womanhood and three brothers in early childhood.

The funeral of the late Mrs. MacKenzie was held Friday, Oct. 4th, and was largely attended by sympathizing friends. A short service was conducted by Rev. G. L. Mercer, D. D., of Maxwell, at the home at 2 p. m. Rev. G. K. McMillan, B.A., D. D., Flesherton, assisted. A song which Mrs. MacKenzie helped to sing the evening before her passing was sweetly sung by Mrs. Clarence Watson and Mrs. Wilfred McNally. "The Unclouded Day". Service was held in St. John's United Church, Flesherton, at 3 p. m., when Rev. McMillan, assisted by Rev. Mercer, gave a comforting message to the bereaved. It was requested by Mrs. MacKenzie that Mrs. Blackburn and Mr. Geo. Cairns sing "He's My Friend". The hymns used were also chosen by the deceased. Interment was made in the family plot in Flesherton Cemetery.

The pallbearers were six neighbors: Messrs. L. H. Sheardown, Roy Lyons, Frank Shier, Clarence Watson, Percy McMullen and Wilfred McNally.

Many beautiful floral offerings formed a bower of colour about the casket. Besides a number from the members of the family and friends, sprays were presented from the Zion Women's Association and the Holiness Mission.
