The Bible Society again makes its annual appeal to the people of this district. What right has this Society to do that at this time of War Emergency—what is it doing to further the Cause of the Kingdom of Christ at this hour in our destiny? Here are the facts:

The Society circulated this year in Germany twice as many copies of the Scriptures, in Italy, three times as many, in China, it is turning out a New Testament every six seconds of the clock to meet the growing demand for the Sacred Word. All over the world, even in spite of war may even because of war and the growing fear of a complete world conflagration, the circulation of the Word continues, and has increased some three quarters of a million over last year. Nearly one million copies per month are now being published and given out and read in over 700 languages.

In Canada alone the Bible is published by the Society in over one hundred languages. The agents of the Society meet the boats at the channel ports, present the immigrant with a copy of the Word in his language, and follow them to the various parts of Canada south to the tobacco country, north to the pulp and mining, west to the farms. The colporteur is at work, he has no rest in peace or war he must keep going.

Over one hundred thousand copies of the New Testament have been given to our soldiers as they left these shores to fight in the Empire cause. How many more will be required no one knows. During the last war millions of New Testaments in many languages were distributed to the fighting forces. It was the one covenant connecting them with their church and home.

There is One Common Bond connecting the world of mankind, it is the Bible. There is One Common Bond connecting the various units of a complex Canada. It is the Bible.

The Society is not ashamed of its appeal in these days for it is doing what it can, in no small way, to bring together humanity and secure a foundation for a lasting Peace.

Cigarettes For Our Boys Now Overseas

The members of Saugeen Lodge No. 327, I.O.O.F., Markdale have undertaken promotion of a plan whereby Canadian cigarettes and tobacco will be sent monthly to each of the local and community soldier boys now training in England. The idea is an excellent one, and has worked out with remarkable success in neighbouring towns and villages.

Citizens will find on the counter of nearly every place of business in Markdale a container, together with a card explaining that if they will but drop their spare coppers, nickels, dimes or quarters in the containers, every cent will be used to send cigarettes and tobacco to the overseas soldiers. These will be addressed to our own local boys, direct from the factory, and delivery is guaranteed. The cost is most favorable, with \$1 sending 300 cigarettes, while \$2.50 will send no less than 1000 cigarettes of any named brand.

So Mr. and Mrs. Citizen, when you see those jars on the counter of your favorite store, barber shop or service station, remember the boys in England, and drop in those spare pieces of small change. You will never miss it, and it will go a long way toward helping our soldiers. Not one penny of the collections so made will be used for a purpose other than the one outlined above.

Mono Electors Will Vote On Council Term

At the October meeting at Mono Centre, Mono Council decided by an unanimous vote to submit the question of a two year term for 1941 council to a vote of the people. The vote will be taken at the same time and places as the vote for the election of next year's council. The question submitted will be in this form: "Are you in favor, as a wartime measure, under the Local Government Extension Act, 1940, of the Municipal Council elected for 1941, holding office for two years?"

Members of the council were agreed that the question was one that the people should be allowed to vote on. This will obviate any necessity for a petition from the ratepayers. Where a council declines to submit the question of its own volition, the only method of securing a vote is by a petition signed by at least five per cent of the electors whose names appeared on the revised voters' lists for 1939. This petition must be prepared and filed with the Clerk of the Municipality at least five weeks before polling day.
