Mono Electors Will Vote On Council Term

At the October meeting at Mono Centre, Mono Council decided by an unanimous vote to submit the quesvote will be taken at the same and places as the vote for the elecof next year's council. The question submitted will be in this form: "Are you in favor, as a wartime measure, under the Local Government Extension Act, 1940, of the Municipal Council elected for 1941, holding office for two years?"

Members of the council were agreed that the question was one that the people should be allowed to vote on. This will obviate any necessity for a petition from the ratepayers. Where a council declines to submit the question of its own volition, the only method of securing a vote is by a petition signed by at least five per cent, of the electors whose names appeared on the revised voters' lists for 1939. This petition must be prepared and filed with the Clerk of the Municipality at least five weeks before polling day.

From A Missionary In Japan To-day

We clip the following from Friday's Globe and Mail and do so be near Kimberley in Euphrasia township and is well known to many of

our readers: Miss Helen Hurd, who has been twenty-nine years a missionary in Japan, writes most interestingly to her friends in Toronto of how it feels to be there at this time.

"During the summer just past," she says, "news of anti-British demonstrations, coupled with rumors of imminent forced evacuation of missionaries, kept Dame Gossip very busy. News gathered volume in passing from mouth to mouth as does a snow ball on a steep grade. Rumors grew like mushrooms. "Our city is in the throes of a census-taking. Formidable blank forms for detailed information were left at every door. To-day the census-taker came round to collect the filled-in forms. Mine was not ready due to lack of a Japanese helper to decipher questions and fill in answers in character. The city official was most affable, offered to do it himself if I would furnish the information. "Pondering these two incidents and their effect on international feeling, I returned to the city.
