## Mr. F. R. Oliver, M.P.P., Spoke To Rotarians

The meeting of the Rotary Club on Tuesday evening was conducted by the members of the Durham Club and an enjoyable meeting it was. Bill McBride of Priceville occupied the chair in the absence of the president of the Durham Club. There was a good attendance of the members of both clubs and much good fellowship was brought out.

Mr. F. R. Oliver, M.P.P. for South Grey, was the speaker of the evening and gave an interesting address, his theme being "Democracy". He explained his views on Democracy and its methods of operation. Democracy is what we make it and when we fail to do our part then we will drift to something which we do not want. There is no place in democracy for selfishness or dictatorship.

He referred to the present awful conflict in which we are engaged and directed the attention of those present to the three great armies which are fighting the battles of democracy, namely: the young men who are in the flying corps, the navy and the land forces; those in the industries manufacturing guns, ammunition, air planes, tanks and other necessary equipment; the agriculturalists who provide food and other supplies to keep the other forces alive. The pay for the industries has been placed at cost plus a profit but that for the agriculturalists has been set at a figure below the cost of production. The farmer must be given a greater share of the moneys being expended or he will not be able to carry on. The income of the farmer today is on the same level as it was in 1913 while his living costs have increased by nearly forty per cent. In setting the price of farm products all possible information should be secured and the packers and others in the processing business should not be allowed to dictate the prices.

The address was well received by those present and Merv Richards, president of the local club, thanked Mr. Oliver for his enlightening talk. Bill Hunter of Egremont introduced the speaker.

## Armistice Service Held On Sunday Afternoon

A largely attended Remembrance Service was held under the auspices of the Markdale branch of the Canadian Legion, in Annesley United Church on Sunday afternoon. The veterans and members of B Company, Grey and Simcoe Foresters, formed up at the Legion, Hall and headed by the Markdale Band, marched to the church.

Mr. K. S. Gemmel, president of the Legion, had charge of the service. He was assisted by the pastor, Rev. S. E. Annis and Mr. John Eyles, Honorary President of the Legion. Following the opening hymn, "O God Our Help", the Lord's prayer and responsive scripture reading, Mr. G. A. Beaton sang "In Flanders Field", Mr. Annis led in prayer. The Last Post was sounded by Mr. Jack Perkins and in solemn silence and with deep reverence a poppy wreath was placed on the altar table, followed by two minutes' of silence and the Reveille.

Rev. S. E. Annis speaking from Rev. 22:2—The leaves of the tree (of Life) are for the healing of the nations, pointed out that faith in the wisdom and love of God was the healing power for broken and sorrowing hearts for the fallen men of the Great War, and that this present war is a part of that pain through which the world is struggling. Whether we win or not depends on whether we have confidence in the righteousness of our cause. We fight not so much against Hitler as against his ideals, not so much for Empire as for world liberty. What we need is a new world of international and social justice—the Kingdom of God in human society based upon love. In Christ is found the healing of the nations.

The collection amounted to \$16.57, which was turned over to the Markdale branch of the Red Cross Society.

Besides his sorrowing wife he is survived by two sons, John and David of Holland, three daughters, Frances of Holland, Mrs. William Rathwell of Owen Sound and Mrs. George Johnson of Meaford; five brothers, Charles, Alex., William, and James of Holland and George of Sault Ste.
