Meat Storage Locker Service

Complying with popular requests we built our Modern Cold Storage — a storage that will give you most satisfactory results for the storing of your meats and other edible products — and a storage of which we are exceedingly proud. We feel that this service will be a great asset to the district and will be a big financial saving - particularly to the farmers. Not only will it be a financial saving but, knowing the quality of the meat you place in the lockers as sures you that you will have that quality of meat at its best for your table at all times.

To obtain the best results as to the preparation of your meat for storing. After killing and allowing the carcass to cool, the meat should be cut into pieces the size that will later be required for use and wrapped in waxed paper. The waxed paper may be ob tained at the creamery at a small cost. When stored in this manner the most meat can be put in a locker.

Our storing charges will be approximately \$1.00 per cubic foot per year. A \$5.00 locker will hold approximately 250 lbs. of meat and a \$6.00 locker will old approximately 300 lbs. of meat. Therefore the cost per lb. for storing, when renting a locker will depend on how often the locker is refilled during the year. The renter of a locker may use his own lock and key and he only will have access to the locker. To those who wish to store a small quantity and who do not wish to rent a locker by the year the charge will be 11/3c per lb.

Cream patrons who sell their cream by truck to the creamery may have the meat service by our truck drivers with no extra charge.

The storage is practically completed and expected to be in operation within the next few days. There is a cordial invitation extended to all interested to come to inspect the plant.
