Davis, a beloved pioneer mother, a highly esteemed and respected friend and neighbour passed away at noon on Monday, Nov. 18th, after a few weeks' illness from the weakness of old age, in her 91st year. Her maiden name was Mary Ann Allen, eldest daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. James Allen of the 2nd con., they being one of the very earliest settlers. Hence, she could vividly recall those early days when the first wheat was cut with the sickle, threshed by hand, winnowed by the wind and carried by her mother three miles to the first mill on the Saugeen. 'Twas a pleasure to listen to hear her tell of the toils and triumphs, the happy days in the woods in spring time and up till a few years ago she loved to go to the woods and engage in syrup and sugar making. The Allen family were of Irish descent, noted for their strength and long life, several of them reaching the nineties.

She was happily wedded April 22, 1842 to Mr. M. J. Davis by Rev. Wm. Park, early Presbyterian minister of Durham and at once began homemaking on lot 9, con. 7, Gienelg, which has been her home ever since. To them were born nine children; five sons and four daughters, seven of whom survive as follows: Jim and Allen of Vancouver; Richard at Bruce, Alta.; David; Holden, Alta.; Basil on the homestead; Mrs. Alex. Vanetta (Allie) of Aldergrove, B.C.; Nellie and Annie, deceased, and Miss Jennie in the home, who has truly proved a ministering angel through the years. There are twenty-two grand children and sixteen great grand children. Mr. Davis passed away in March 1914 and during the years since, she has been a wonderful helper in home and with the farm work.

Of the original Allen family of ten, there remains Joseph of Brandon, David of Durham, Mrs. Hannah (Maggie) of Mt. Forest and Mrs. W. J. McFarlane (Sarah) on the old homestead.

The funeral is being held at the home on Wednesday afternoon at 2 p.m., the pastor, Rev. W. H. Smith of Durham, in charge of the service. Interment in Zion cemetery.
