



#### Most Airlines Using Beams

Signals In Waves; Pilot Can Tell When He Is Off Course

mercial routes are usually guided to their destination by a radio "beam" transmitted from a control station at the airport. dinary radio transmission sends out signals in waves, much the same as when a stone is dropped into a pool of water, creating widening ripples. However, "beam" transmission creates a strong signal or impulse sent out in a straight line in the direction of a given point. Other systems use a double "beam," as many have been the case in this ac-cident. If one "beam" or half

fails, the pilot may stray. Accordingly, an aircraft pilot on leaving his airport, tunes his receiver to this "beam" and as ong as he can hear the signal he cnows he is on his correct route. If the signal fades, he knows that he is flying away from the beam, and corrects this fault by changing his course. The "beam" from the airport which he has left is usually joined by "beam" from the airport which he is heading, with the re sult that the pilot can fly directy along the "beam" to his des
