Christmas Tree Trade Growing

Seasonal Forest Industry In Canada

Millions of Christmas trees will again bring joy and happiness to homes in the United States and Canada, according to the Domin-ion Forest Service, Department of Mines and Resources. Handed down from ancient times, the delightful Christmas tree custom now provides au important seasonal forest in supplementary source of revenue to Canadian farmers, this year the export of Christmas trees to the United States will help establish foreign exchange for the purchase of war supplies.

TO LARGE U. S. CITIES Last year approximately six million evergreens were cut in Canada as Christmas trees, of which lmost five million valued at \$574,-235 were exported to the United States. New York City alone took about 750,000 trees, while large shipments were made to Boston Philadelphia, Cleveland, Detroit, and Chicago. On the Pacific coast. the large cities as far south as Los Angeles now offer an attractive market for British Columbia trees used annually to decorate Canadian
