Morale of Enemy Cannot Be Counted Upon
(The Flesherston Advance)
Windsor, Dec. 30th, 1940

Dear Editor:

Since it has not been my pleasure or privilege to visit Flesherston to speak personally with numerous old friends and meet some of the younger generation who have entirely outgrown my memory, I take this opportunity of writing these few lines.

You have, no doubt by this date, some knowledge of our dangerous, strenuous and miraculous escape from Paris. It cannot be described otherwise and it is only by our thoughts and deepest sympathy for those friends who we have left behind, that we can appreciate how fortunate we have been in getting away.

Imagine our sudden emotion on the departure of the French government, after which, for us, only remained from 8 p.m. until six o'clock in the morning, to do likewise and from that moment we experienced fourteen days in which anything might have happened. On four occasions we were extremely fortunate, having had to leave our car and find shelter, nine times in one afternoon. After that period our experiences, although less dangerous, were none the less irritating.

Ten days at Toulouse seeking a ticket for the boat, which would entitle us to have the necessary visas to enter Spain and Portugal. Permission to leave France, a long and dirty trip across Spain and Portugal to Lisbon, and then to our greatest horror we were forced, after waiting four weeks, to sail on a Greek boat. Anything else would certainly have been desired. On land one can always look forward with courage, take action, fulfill them, but looking down into that profound green ocean and wondering how, in case of necessity, a little family of four could ever hold together, was one of the most nerve-wrecking experiences imaginable. Our life boats were lowered and we were shown our places and given our life preservers. To each and every one existed the same chance.

But now that it is over, let it be forgotten and let us look forward to what we can do for England. Dear old England! Devastated, bleeding, men, women and babies suffering to the extreme, but still going strong. It must not be forgotten we are far from the scene of action, we cannot in Canada imagine the extent of cruelty and disaster, but the more we hear of it, the more should be our desire and effort to help, the stronger should be our war-cry.

Passing a window, I read: "Be British, keep your chin up"; let us keep the chins of England up and by so doing, we are certain that our own shall be carried likewise.

We can no longer look forward nor depend on the morale of our enemies aiding us to victory. Morale in these countries is now changing into power of control, and any attempt to weaken conviction of victory among those people is quenched in the blood of the guilty one.

We shall never tolerate domination, so in our determination let each and every one, in an utmost effort to maintain our liberty, make of 1941, a triumphant and happy New Year.

Joseph J. Richardson

When Mr. Joseph J. Richardson passed away at an early hour on Friday morning last Markdale lost one of its most highly esteemed and well beloved citizens. The deceased had suffered from a paralytic seizure in July and since that time had gradually weakened until the happy release on Friday.

Joseph J. Richardson was a son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Richardson and was born on a farm in Euphrasia now occupied by Mr. John Graham. He farmed for several years before moving to Markdale and during that time became interested in Western lands. After coming to the village he continued dealing in Western real estate until he entered the employ of F. T. Hill & Co. in the hardware department. He later purchased the harness business and while conducting this business took the agency for the Gray Dort cars. In 1919 he sold the harness business to the late J. W. Lyons and purchased the hardware business from Mr. W. J. Bowes which he conducted for a few years and then sold to Mr. W. S. Perkins. He continued in the automobile and implement business until his health failed last year.

Mr. Richardson was twice married, his first wife being Alice Bradey of Euphrasia township. After her death he married Ellen Bradey about 30 years ago and she, along with two children, Mrs. W. W. Graham and Manley Richardson, survive.

While in Euphrasia the deceased served as Councillor and since coming to the village served on the Public and High School Boards. He was a faithful member of Christ church and had served as Warden. For more than fifty years he had been a member of L.O.L. No. 1045 and a few years ago was made honorary member. He was a Past Master. A member of Victoria Preceptory for nearly thirty years he had served as Wor. Preceptor in 1915. As a churchman, citizen and friend there were few his equal.

The funeral on Sunday was largely attended. A short service was conducted at the house and the remains were then conveyed to Christ Church. Here Rev. C. O. Pherrill, the rector, paid tribute to the Christian character of the deceased. The remains were laid to rest in the cemetery chapel to await burial in the family plot in the spring.
