Man With Broken Neck Is Making Good Progress

(The Paisley Advocate)
Although doctors in the Toronto General Hospital still express astonishment at the fact that he is still alive, Stuart Howe, local man who a week ago suffered a double fracture of the neck in a minor automobile accident, news of his progress toward complete recovery continue to emanate from his bed in the big city institution.
As was reported in last week's issue, Mr. Howe sustained a broken neck when he was thrown sharply sideways as his car went out of control on the icy surface of the Elora Road near Rae's bridge a week ago Monday night. But, entirely unaware that he had been seriously injured, Mr. Howe personally assisted in removing his car from the deep snow bank into which it had plunged, drove his machine back to town and retired to bed. It was only after he lay down that severe pains forced him to seek the attention of a doctor, whose examination revealed the extent and seriousness of Mr. Howe's injury.
We understand that Mr. Howe is undergoing similar treatment to that which General Hospital specialists used in effecting a recovery for Mr. Dan McIntyre of 4th con. Elderslie, who suffered almost identical fractures of the neck three years ago when he was struck on the head by a large chunk of frozen hay which fell upon him from the mow. The treatment requires that the patient lie flat on his back, with the head protruding slightly back over the end of the bed. A pair of ordinary ice tongs are attached to either side of the skull, hanging downward, and to these is attached a 20-lb weight. This harness ensures that the fractured bones of the neck will be kept rigidly in place, thereby permitting the bones to knit with the greatest possible speed. The cure is drastic, but has proven to be most effective, and Mr. Howe's friends will be sympathizing with his painful ordeal, but hoping for a rapid return to perfect condition.
