Are You Sending Anything By Parcel Post to a Friend In His Majesty's Forces?

Postmaster General William I Mulock further facilitates the sending of comforts to our Force abroad. Through arrangements with the British Postal authorities, all His Majesty's forces overseas will now benefit from the special reduced rate of 12 cents a pound (weight limit 11 pounds) on par-cels mailed to them from Canada, according to an announcement from the Postmaster General early in February AT 12c A POUND

The low rate of 12 cents : pound (limit of weight unds) applies now on parcels for overseas mailed from Can-ada addressed to the following:-Members of British, Canadian Dominion or other Colonial troops serving in the United Kingdom or in places outside the United Kingdom.

He called on the breeders to consider some kind of program for the destruction of the dogs which are causing heavy damage. Killer dogs are the main factor acting against the increased pro-duction of sheep in the Province, "MAKE LAMB GOOD

Hon. P. M. Dewan, Ontario Minister of Agriculture spoke briefly to the sheep raisers. He told them he could see no res why the sheep production in the Province was not increasing "Some people believe," he said "that there would be a greate consumption of lamb if there were more readily available." must get the low income group to eat it, Dr. W. G. Hopper, of the Dominion Department of Ag riculture declared.

Early Symptoms Of Tuberculosis

> In an article written for "Health", official organ of the Health League of Canada, shortly before his death last month the late Dr. J. W. S. McCullong uberculosis as:



If these are used without a thor-ough cleansing by a healthy person, he may contract the disease s a result.
BY WAY OF PREVENTION

Unpasteurized milk, if taken from a tuberculous cow, is likeby to infect the drinker. A tu-berculous mother who kisses her bbay on the mouth is almost sure to pass the disease on to the child. By way of prevention, Dr. Mc-Cullough urged that children of school or pre-school age, students in secondary schools and workers be examined periodically by a T.B. expert.

K. G. Meldahl has published in Copenhagen a book in which he presents conclusions from studies of tides in the atmosphere of the sun, which he as-cribes to gravitational disturbances produced by the planets. The planets studied were Mercury, Venus, the Earth, Jupiter and Saturn. The first three are small planets, but relatively close to the sun, while the latter two are very large, but at consider-able distances. The half periods tion of their effects were studie with reference to positions on the sun's surface and not to space co-ordinates. bubbles will form. Be sure that there is no dust present on the surface to be var-nished and that a minimum of dust is in the room. Use a first quality flat brush and dip it gently into the varnish
