## THE PRESS AND THE CHURCHES

One of the most easily misconstrued relationships in the publishing field is that between the newspaper and the churches in the community it serves. The newspaper man asks himself the question: "What should be my attitude toward the churches?" He endeavours to answer that question so that he will be fair both to the churches and to himself.

Churches sometimes assume the attitude that as they are supported solely by voluntary donations, and as they are a spiritual and moral force in the community, any publicity desired should be given without charge by the newspaper. Strangely enough the churches do not expect the same privilege from any other business or profession. It should be remembered at the outset that most publishers are church members, and that as individuals they are decidedly interested in the welfare of the church with which they are affiliated. They give regularly and as generously as their circumstances permit. They attend the various functions designed to raise funds for the continuance of the church's work. As such they must be considered as any other church member who is conscientiously striving to support the church and what it stands for.

While newspapers are more generous with space to churches than to other institutions, it is simply a recognition by the newspaper

### Census Taking

Census enumeration will mean more than a mere counting of noses according to instructions received from Ottawa that all who engage in the work will find themselves with a hard job on their hands.

Enumerators will be paid five cents for every living Canadian recorded, according to the federal orders.

Data to be provided will result in an accurate and comprehensive inventory of the nation. The information will place the government in possession of valuable data upon which to base plans for reconstruction during the post-war period.

The type of men to do the enumeration, according to official instructions will be on an intelligence level. Appointments must not be made out of partisan consideration and where possible, preference is to be given to veterans of the last war.

Dr. J. A. McArthur has been appointed as the chief enumerator for the riding of Grey-Bruce, and Mr. H. H. Boyes of Meaford is in charge of the work in North Grey.

All enumerators will be required to take an oath that they will pursue their duties conscientiously. This will include an obligation of utmost secrecy with respect to data secured from citizens.

Taking the census over farm areas and among industries and business places will be a little different from the ordinary house to house work. Census of farm livestock will be required as well as details concerning land occupied, ownership, tenancy, mortgages, taxes, agreements, slaughtering and sale of cattle and the disposition made of the cattle slaughtered for the trade or home consumption.

When the census of a farm is completed it will practically represent an inventory and will constitute comprehensive information for the government on every farm operated in Canada. The forms go so far as to tabulate data touching upon floriculture followed on a farm and what it amounts to in revenue, if any.

The government is searching for basic facts which can be of assistance in the solution of problems and particularly with reconstruction. It is estimated the census is the most effective and economical means of gathering information.

The census will officially start at midnight between June 1 and June 2.
