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Organization of the County of Grey for the 1941 Dominion Victory Loan is practically complete.

Chairmen have been selected in most of the principal county centres, and by next week the entire complement of local canvassers will have been appointed. The objective for Grey County is to be set soon. This will be divided into the various divisions and an amount allotted to each division. In the last Victory Loan—that of 1919—every division of Grey County went over the top to reach and far exceed the objective.

Markdale will have T. H. Reburn as chairman of the committee and captain of the canvassers; Thornbury-Clarksburg, Claude Running; Meaford, E. T. Copper. In Flesher-ton Reeve Alfred Down is chairman, with J. A. Richards as canvasser captain. Chairman and Canvasser Captain in Dundalk is Reeve D. T. Wright; in Durham it is Gordon Webster, and for Hanover, John A. Paterson heads the local committee and the canvassers. Each of these centres also includes some of the townships surrounding. Chairman are yet to be named for Chatsworth and district, and for the rural district surrounding Owen Sound, which comprises the townships of Keppel, Sarawak, Derby and Sydenham.

On every hand, those in charge of the Grey County end of the Dominion's \$600,000,000 loan announced on Tuesday are finding the finest of co-operation. That Grey County will do its full share in reaching the Dominion objective goes without saying. In the last great war loan this County reached a 162 per cent. of the objective set, and it is confidently believed that Grey County will do no less this war.

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The Functions of the Press

This is one of a series of editorials specially designed to acquaint our readers with the various functions of the Press in a democratic community.

The Functions Of An Editor

The title "editor" is sometimes misunderstood by newspaper readers, not because they want to misunderstand but because they have never been told just what the functions are of the person who holds this title. An editor, to explain it briefly, is one who superintends, revises or prepares literary matter for publication. The title does not necessarily mean that the policy of the newspaper is set or controlled by the editor. On large newspapers there are many editors, and policy is usually decided upon by the managing editor. The duties of the other editors, city, sport, suburban, women's page and others, is simply to carry out the duties prescribed in their particular spheres.

For our purpose, however, we must deal with the editor in a little different light, because in fully 90% of Canada's weekly newspapers, the editor is also the publisher. In other words he fills the dual role of preparing literary matter for publication, and of deciding upon policy as well. We want to deal with the functions of an editor from this standpoint.

Essentially the editor is a human being, writing and dealing with men, women and children. He may be young or old, lazy or energetic, bold or timid, superficial or deep, querulous or constructive, slovenly or business-like, grasping or generous.

Major Ivor Wagner Spoke To Local Rotary Club

Major Ivor Wagner of the Grey & Simcoe Foresters was the speaker at the regular meeting of the Rotary Club on Tuesday evening and his talk was one of the best we have heard in reference to Canada's war effort. Major Wagner was a private in the last war and three years ago visited Germany while touring Europe. He knew his subject and presented the facts so that none could doubt his sincerity or the facts. Canada needs 13,000,000 Churchill's at the present time he said. Of course there are none of us qualified to take the place of the original but we can all enter into the war effort with the same serious view point which has guided the mind and judgment of the great English statesman. If each individual would do what he considers Churchill would be doing were he located in Canada and in the same circumstances the results would be astounding. There are many things which need doing but there are so few willing to sacrifice their own pleasures to serve Canada and the Empire. Most of us feel that it would be below our dignity to spend our time gathering up scrap metals or rags to help in the efforts which are necessary. Let George do that; it's too unimportant for fellows like us. Selfishness is the one great obstacle to a united effort and each individual is inclined to shirk from assisting in the advancement of community effort. Let each individual measure his own worth by comparison to the service being given by the humblest private in the active service.

During the evening Major Wm. French of the Second Battalion of the Grey & Simcoe Foresters and Capt. W. E. Harris of the First Battalion were each presented with a pen and pencil set by their fellow members of the Rotary Club.

Among those present were Brigadier General T. J. Rutherford, Major Fell and Lieut. Allan Stewart of the Grey & Simcoe Foresters.

Brigadier General Rutherford was called on before the close of the meeting and responded with a stirring address in which he referred to the splendid set of officers and men who are serving in the units where our young men have enlisted.

Canada's 1941 Victory Loan Is The Big News These Days

In Canada during the next six weeks, news of every description will be overshadowed by the news of the preparation and the actual progress of Canada's Victory Loan 1941. From information available at Ottawa, it becomes evident that the Loan campaign will be just about the biggest community undertaking ever launched in the Dominion of Canada.

The selling of bonds to large companies and to the bigger investors is a professional job. These professional bond salesmen will be paid for doing this work—likely on a salary basis. But since this new loan cannot possibly be fully subscribed unless tens of thousands of citizens in more moderate circumstances buy, there remains to be done a tremendous selling job by patriotic people who will work for no remuneration. Their payment will be satisfaction in carrying out a patriotic work which is just as important as anything else they could do for their country.

Hundreds of thousands of men, women and children will take part in what may prove to be the dramatic highlight of Canada's war effort. They will stand solemnly around the Torch which is to be sent to Winston Churchill, and dedicate themselves anew to the task of providing the tools with which the British Empire may finish the job.
