Twenty-seven Pupils Write Entrance At Markdale

The High School Entrance examinations commenced this Thursday morning with twenty-seven candidates writing. This year under the new course of study the Grade VIII or Senior Fourth Class will write papers on literature, mathematics, composition and grammar and spelling while writing will be marked on one of the above subjects. For the other subjects of Grade VIII the pupils are passed by their teachers. The pass standard is a minimum of forty per cent on each subject with an average of sixty per cent. On account of some pupils being granted the High School Entrance standing on their year's work by the High School Entrance Boards and thus not needing to write the above subjects the number of candidates writing is not as large as before this regulation came into force.

Victory Loan Campaign

Grey County did her bit in the 1941 Victory Loan. With a heavy quota of \$2,300,000 for the County and the city of Owen Sound combined, the people and institutions of Grey County actually bought \$2,615,200 worth of bonds. This meant that the quota was exceeded by 113.7 per cent.

Every canvassing district in the County "went over the top" with a single exception, and that district was very close. Hanover with the largest quota outside of Owen Sound, sold \$305,050 in bonds in the district, which included also the townships of Bentinck and Normanby. This was 130 per cent of the quota. Meaford was very close behind, with sales of \$225,250, for 127.6 per cent of the quota of \$200,000. There was a great race between these two districts for top place in the final standing. While a few more thousand dollars may be dribbled in after this compilation was made on Tuesday night, the figures are substantially the final figures for the county.

The surprise of the entire campaign was the district of Dundalk, Proton and part of Osprey. This district was lagging very badly a week ago. To-day it stands at 112.6 per cent of its objective, a very creditable showing. Durham, Egremont and Glenelg also made a very strong finish after a rather slow start.

Markdale and Euphrasia, one of the smallest canvassing districts turned in one of the most creditable showings with 121.5 per cent of objective. Flesherton, the first district to reach the 100 per cent mark kept right on going to end up with 111.9 per cent. Thornbury-Clarksburg and Collingwood township made a very creditable showing with \$136,550 subscribed for 109.2 per cent of the objective.

Odd Fellows' Grand Lodge Met In Toronto

We represented the local Odd Fellows' lodge at the annual meeting of the Grand Lodge held in the King Edward Hotel in Toronto on Thursday and Friday of last week and thoroughly enjoyed the outing. We were greatly impressed with the faithful attendance of the delegates, about 500 in number, at each session. It seemed too, in that practically all delegates were present every minute of the sessions.

Under the direction of the Grand Master, Mr. Chas. M. Iredale of Preston, the business was well handled and good order was maintained at all times. There were few contentious matters but these were not allowed to disturb the harmony of Grand Lodge. There were no changes made in the laws and regulations which will affect any lodge. At the sessions last year the delegates promised a donation of \$50,000 to Canada's war effort, but to date little more than one third has been paid. Donations were asked from each lodge but the matter was not taken seriously by those responsible with the result that the matter was allowed to drag. No doubt the lodges will come across now with the necessary contributions.

The Home Board gave some information regarding the new home located at Barrie. We believe if the Board gave full information regarding the business of this branch of the order's activities there would be less criticism but when large sums of money are spent, very large in comparison with similar institutions, then criticism must be expected. The subordinate lodges provide the money and they should be kept fully informed as to its expenditures.

The order throughout Ontario as a whole is in excellent financial condition and during the year ending Sept. 30, 1940, \$129,605.54 was paid for sick benefits and relief. The membership in no other organization provides so much money for the relief of distress as the I.O.O.F. pays out in Ontario. A proposal to consolidate the funds for such work would we believe, help matters provided the offices to administer the funds were set up in one of the smaller centres where the costs would be kept in keeping with the services rendered. The high costs in the larger centres have taken too much and in many organizations have almost eliminated the chances of a successful future.

The business of the Grand Lodge is in good hands. P. V. Ibbetson, a young lawyer in Port Arthur, is the Grand Master. He has good judgment and common sense. He'll make good. N. J. M. Lockhart of St. Catharines has been re-elected as Grand Treasurer and he's good. William Brooks of Toronto has been Grand Secretary for thirty-two years and he's still going strong. Without doubt he is the most efficient secretary of any organization operating in Ontario at the present time.
