First Tank in Canada Produced by Canadian Pacific Railway



Gratefully accepted by the Government for use by the Canadian Army, the first of thousands of tanks to be produced at the Angus Works of the Canadian Pacific Railway Company, Montreal, rolled off the assembly line and gave an impressive test performance before a large group of government and company officials, newspaper men and shop workers.

It was a new note in Canada's war history when this mighty war machine rumbled out of the shops, to be turned over to the Government by D. C. Coleman, vice-president, Canadian Pacific Railway, who said: "This machine is the child of sweat and tears. It will be followed by hundreds and thousands of others to help the Empire to its victory."

Hon. C. D. Howe, Minister of Munitions and Supply, praised Mr. Coleman, H. B. Bowen, chief of motive power and rolling stock of the railway, and the workers who had done the job. He said that the armor plate on the tank is equal to that to be found anywhere. Hon. J. L. Ralston, Minister of National Defence, spoke of the great need for all these machines as fast as they can be produced and thanked the railway and the workers for doing such a fine job. He revealed that 300 of the tanks being made at Angus will be for the British Purchasing Commission. Sir Clive Baillieu, head of the British Purchasing Commission in the United States, said this first tank was "a symbol of Canada's war effort and a portent of Hitler's doom."
