Hugh Templin Asked To Visit Britain

Hugh Templin, editor of the Fergus News-Record, has been chosen as one of a party of ten Canadian newspapermen to go to Great Britain as guests of the British Council in London.

The invitation was extended by Sir Malcolm Robertson, President of the British Council. It is planned to let the Canadian journalists see first hand the preparations for the Battle of Britain. The group will spend three weeks in Great Britain and will cross the Atlantic by plane.

Details of the trip have not been made public yet, but it is said that the Fergus editor has been chosen as the representative of the Canadian Weekly Newspapers. The invitation was extended through W. Rupert Davies of Kingston, President of the Canadian Section of the Empire Press Union.

The Fergus editor has been spending one day or more each week visiting the various training schools of the Commonwealth Aid Training Plan in Canada and is writing a series of articles about them. The invitation to do similar work in Britain came as a surprise to him.

Schools will open on the statutory date, the 2nd of September, but pupils who have been engaged in the summer in farm work may absent themselves until October 1st.

Foresters Leave Sunday For Niagara Camp

The 2nd Battalion Grey & Simcoe Foresters, R.A., leaves Sunday morning for camp at Niagara-on-the-Lake and will return home on August 31. It is expected that the local company will travel to Meaford, where they will entrain, then meet the main part of the Battalion and proceed to Toronto, which will be reached around noon, where the troops will have dinner. They will take the afternoon boat to Niagara. "B" Company is being taken into camp by Lieut. F. J. Thurston of Flesherton, second in command, in the absence of Major W. Turner, the O.C., who is in hospital in Toronto.
