Best Advertising Medium

Merchants who wish to increase Earl iklirkpatrick and ronto announce the engagement of sales will be interested in knowing the actual value of Arthur Rollason, the marriage to vertising as compared with other mediums, says an exchange. Nationally known public accountants in the United States asked two questions of consumers in Louisville, Ky. who received all forms of advertising. The questions were: (1) What of the members who wish to contrikind of advertising influences you most in your buying? (2) Which of the various types of advertising do you find the most objectionable?

Here is how advertising was grad ed: (1) Theatre screen advertising is the least effective; (2) Billboards and circulars are next poorest; (3) Radio and direct mail follow and (4) Newspaper advertising was declared the most effective to the pub-

Furthermore the survey foun that newspaper advertising sold more than all other media combined. The figures are that newspapers sell 56 per cent. of all goods sold by advertising; all other media sell 44 per cent. Sixty-five out of every 100 women buy from newspaper advertising and 51 out of every 100 men are likewise influenced. Two of every 100 women buy from circulars but 10 of every 100 women object to circulars, while one of every 100 men buy from circulars and 10 object. Thirty of every 100 women object to billboard advertising and 42 of every 100 object to theatre screen

We are not told, but we should think about 99 out of every 100 men and women object to radio advertising, especially on Sunday.
