Farmers' Night At Local Rotary Club

Bells and bell music was the topic of Mr. Buchanan's after dinner speech at the local rotary club Tuesday evening. Speaking to the rotarians and their farmer guests, Mr. Buchanan, who is head of the Department of Extension at the Ontario Agricultural College, informed his hearers that the subject upon which he was speaking was not an agricultural topic but farmers did not always want to hear about agriculture and would perhaps welcome a change.

Tracing the origin of bells and their place in the early music, literature and architecture of various countries he showed the influence that bells have had through the ages. Bells were used for religious festivals, marriages, wars, and fires centuries ago but it is only in the past two or three centuries that they were used to give a composition of music.

There are two types of bells used for carillon music; one type originated in England and the other type in the lowlands.

Up to 1914 there were no sets of bells in Canada and United States but since that time a great number of centres in both countries have installed them. The people of both countries are becoming bell music conscious and many beautiful concerts are heard broadcasted from the bell towers. The peace tower at Ottawa is a fine example of the architecture required for the housing of a set of bells and the bells themselves are well selected to give splendid programs.

Near the end of the address Professor Buchanan had a number of slides thrown upon the screen which depicted the most celebrated bells of the world. It was interesting to note that the Russians owned the largest bell in the world, which weighed over 150 tons while Big Ben of London fame was in about thirteenth place in the world's large bells.

Professor Buchanan's address was much enjoyed and it is hoped that he will be able to return again to the club to bring another of his addresses for which he is well known.
