Three Year Old Boy Spent Night In Bush

Gregory Patton, the three-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Wesley Patton of Blantyre spent a night in the bush last week when he wandered away from home late in the afternoon. He was about the home at five o'clock but when darkness set in he was nowhere to be found. Appeals for help brought about 200 neighbors who spent the night searching for the youngster. Early in the morning he was discovered asleep in the bush with his faithful dog, a Spaniel, on guard. The dog would not permit any of the searchers to touch the child until the father arrived. The boy suffered no bad effects from his night in the bush and the parents are convinced that Blantyre people are real neighbours in time of need.

The Salvage Campaign

Last spring an intimation to the effect that a Fall Salvage Campaign during the last week of October would be conducted was announced. This is a reminder that from October 27 to November 1—one week only—the salvage will be collected in a manner similar to that in the spring.

The materials wanted are: newspapers, magazines, boxes, cartons, bags, wrapping paper (if folded), cardboard, rags, such as burlap, twine, carpet canvas, old clothing, copper, brass, lead, zinc, aluminum, cast iron, steel, wrought iron, rubber, tin foil from tea, tobacco and chocolate bar packages, tooth paste and shave cream tubes and felt mattresses.

There are a few salvage victory bags available at the Department of Agriculture. These can be secured free of charge by calling for them.

To make it easier and to be sure your salvage is collected, please call Markdale No. 179.

Please tie all papers in bundles, put all rags in separate containers and kindly have the things ready so unnecessary delay may be avoided.

This is a war effort which should have the support of everyone in the village. The materials asked for are unnecessary at your home and indeed may be just a nuisance.

Only one week will be devoted to the work because the skating rink will be required in the near future. Undoubtedly, since house cleaning or autumn clean-up of yards, considerable material is available.

The rural people can also assist. Have you any scrap metal, rags, etc. lying around? If so, these materials are very urgently required as there is a most serious shortage. Needless to say, however, it will be impossible to collect this from the farms. If you could bring any salvage you collected with you when you come to do your shopping, it would be most appreciated.

We anticipate the most responsive co-operation.

Mervyn Johnston stood second in the individual scoring, receiving 77.6 points. Ed. Shoultice received 71.4 standing 6th, and Robt. Clark 67.7 points, or a total of 216.7, which was just 7 or less than 1/4 of a point behind the winning team. This was Haldimand County.

Grey County boys did well. They are all eligible to attend next year's match, so it is hoped they may bring home the first prize.

All of these boys will be plowing at the various matches still to be held. We will watch them with interest in their effort to reach the top.

Father J. D. Egan

Rev. Father John D. Egan, former parish priest in Markdale, died on Sunday at St. Joseph's hospital in Guelph, after a lengthy illness. The news of his death created general sorrow among the church people here.

Father Egan, who was in his 46th year, was a son of the late Mr. and Mrs. J. B. Egan and was born at Ceylon. The family moved to Dundalk and J. D. grew to young manhood there.
