A farmer, gardener, livestock or poultry producer, or fisherman is not subject to licence, unless he buys such goods for resale

After December 1, 1941, when any of the above goods are bought for resale, both the seller's and Licence Application Forms will be distributed through the mail. Persons who do not receive one should apply at their Post Office where copies of the Licensing Order may also be secured A Window Certificate and a Licence Identification Card will be issued to each licensee. The Certificate

After December 1, 1941, no unlicensed person may buy for resale, handle, or sell any of the above goods

## EUPHRASIA COUNCIL MINUTES

Rocklyn, October 6th, 1941 The regular meeting of the Euphrasia Council met on above date with all members present and the Reeve in the chair.

Minutes of last meeting were read and confirmed.

Lee - Miller-That this Council endorse the following resolution re guarding hydro dam at Eugenia and that the Clerk be authorized to forward same to Hon. C. D. Conant, Chairman Civillan Defense Committee; also a copy to Mr. R. H. French, Commanding Euphrasia Civil Guard.—Carried. Whereas, during a time of war there is always the menace of enemy action, of the action of saboteurs, to destroy public proper-ty, and especially property and machinery designed for the produc-tion of power to produce war material.

And whereas, in the Township of Euphrasia, County of Grey, Ontario, there exists a very serious threat to the lives and property of hundreds of people in the said Township in the event that the dam at Eugenia were to be suddenly broken or destroyed by such ac-

And whereas, at the present time there is no protection against such a contingency, or if there is supposed to be such a protection it is of no value, when every effort should be exerted for the protection of the citizens of the district affected by such action. It is hereby resolved by this Council in regular session assembled, that the attention of the Attorney-General for the Province of Ontario, be drawn to the existence of this very serious situation and to the lack of anything like adequate protection against the actions of And also that the Attorney-General be urged to take this matter

And also that an official First Aid organization be set up in this Township, fully equipped and trained to cope with the results of such possible and indeed probable, action of enemy agents. And also that the attention of the Attorney-General be drawn to he fact that this resolution is framed as a consequence of the opin ion of this Council, that a very real responsibility rests on the shoulders of the Government of this Province for having the lives and property of its citizens adequately protected when such a con-
