Two Holland Centre men received injuries and their car was wrecked when they ran into the back end of Swift's truck, parked on Toronto Street, Sunday evening.

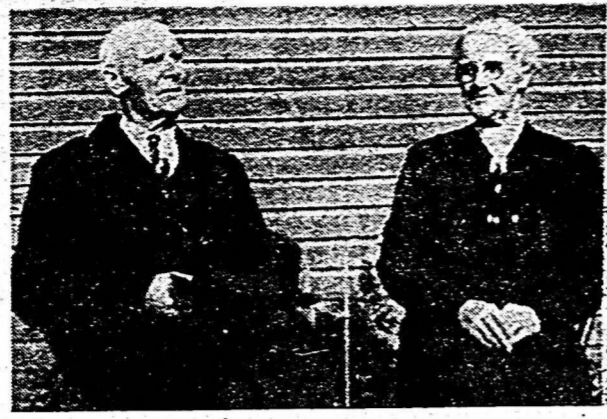
