Cream Cans For Use As Cream Cans Only

In this issue of The Standard an adv. is inserted by Markdale Creamery Co., asking for the return of cream cans which have been taken out of circulation. In conversation with Mr. Borinsky, one of the proprietors, he mentioned the fact that they have put into circulation 9000 cans and that many of them, a great many, are being used for purposes other than the delivering of cream to the creamery. Under war-time regulations metal cannot now be procured for the making of new cans and it is absolutely necessary to have all cans, whether the property of the local creamery or not, returned to the owners so that they may be used for the purpose intended. It is unlawful to use cream cans for any purpose other than delivery of cream but it is hoped no drastic measures may be necessary in order to get the use of the cans.

New Cemetery Regulations Are Now In Force

The Ontario Department of Health is responsible for new regulations which govern cemeteries in the province and which came into force at the beginning of the new year. In order to be ready to comply with the requirements of the new regulations for the government of the local cemetery a good many evenings and considerable time during working hours have been spent in the preparation of regulations for present and future needs. These regulations were adopted by the Board in time to have them come into force at the same time as the new provincial regulations. The regulations of Markdale Cemetery will be printed in book form and will be available to all owners of lots or others particularly interested.

Wartime Wage Control Instructions

The National War Labour Board has issued instructions to Canadian employers and employees in regard to the Wartime Wages and Cost of Living Bonus Order (P.C. 8253).

As detailed in the advertisement appearing elsewhere in this issue, these instructions define what are national industries falling within the scope of the National War Labour Board at Ottawa, and those that come within the jurisdiction of provincial, or Regional War Labour Boards.

Since wage control, together with price control, have become integral parts of Canada's wartime design for living, the National War Labour Board has considered it necessary to demarcate, for the purposes of the administration of the Order, the respective jurisdictions of the National and Regional Boards.

In general, National employers are designated as those whose operations—such as transportation and public utilities etc.—are inter-provincial in character, or those whose industrial activities—particularly mining and shipbuilding—are closely related to the national war effort as a whole.

Regional employers are considered those in which the operations of the industry or business is definitely within provincial or municipal boundaries. In this category fall most war production plants, all sections of retail and wholesale trade, and services, etc.

Employers and employees in the national field should address their communications to the Secretary, the National War Labour Board, Ottawa, while those in the Regional category should address themselves to the Regional War Labour Board in care of their respective provincial governments.

Interpretative Rulings on the Order have been issued in bulletin form, and these may be obtained on application to any Regional War Labour Board.

At the regular meeting of Holland Council held on Wednesday the members endorsed the Total War Effort as sponsored at the big gathering in Toronto on Saturday.

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The special recommendation that a Grey County War Committee be organized was approved by everyone present. The Reeves of each Township were selected to act as chairmen and the various Councils were delegated to appoint two or three representatives in each School Section. A list of these will be given all local papers next week. Their duties were threefold.

1. To secure a census of the School Section so that all available resources may be harnessed in an all-out production program. There will be a few irrelevant questions which may not seem to be worth while but they will be useful in the near future.

2. To act as a Township group which will assist in co-ordinating the efforts of the Labour and Agricultural Departments.

3. Lastly, but most important to act in an advisory capacity with the Department of Militia in conserving rural man power for the production of food.

The special forms referred to will be mailed this week. The census is required as soon as possible but preferably before Saturday, January 24th. It is anticipated that 90% of the farmers will give the information. If, however, they do not wish to co-operate, there is nothing which requires their giving the information. It is a most democratic principle nevertheless being adopted to secure the information.

No farmer doing the work will receive any remuneration whatsoever. His time will be donated. Because of this, a most sincere and earnest appeal is being made to every farmer to co-operate. It may be the means of your securing help in many ways.

We have not the space to publish all of the regulations but will give the prices of lots and other services as provided for. A lot 16x18 sells at \$30.00; 12x18 at \$22.50; 8x18 at \$15.00; 18x10 at \$18.00; 12x10 at \$13.50; 8x10 at \$9.00; 4x10 at \$5.00. Perpetual upkeep charges in each case are the same price as the lots.

Some of the charges for services are as follows: Opening grave for 30-inch shell over 60 inches in length, \$8.00; over 30 inches wide \$9.00; steel of same size \$9.00; concrete \$12.00; 40 to 60-inch shells, wood \$6.00, steel \$8.00; concrete \$10.00; under 40 inches, wood \$5.00, steel \$8.00; concrete \$3.00.

Sunday interments \$3.00 extra. Winter interments \$3.00 extra amount pays for use of chapel for local interments. Use of chapel for other cemeteries \$6.00.

Provision has been made for other services and the charges for same are enumerated in the regulations.

At a meeting held on Monday evening the officers were chosen for 1942 as follows: Chairman, Dr. L. G. Campbell; Vice-Chairman, T. H. Wilson; Secretary and Treasurer, A. E. Colgan. The other members of the Board are A. O. Gillespie, W. J. Marshall, Wm. Mann and Sanford Ward. Dr. Campbell and Messrs. Wilson and Colgan were among those first appointed to the Board more than twenty years ago. Four of the original appointees, Hon. I. B. Lucas, Messrs. M. Armstrong, C. W. Rutledge and Hugh Mercer have passed on as also Mrs. C. E. Armstrong and Mr. S. J. Halbert who served as members of the Board. Messrs. C. R. McHugh and John Hannah were valued members of the Board until they removed from the village.

The officials of the village were all re-appointed and Miss L. Mathews was engaged to act as secretary and treasurer of the Hydro Electric System to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of A. E. Colgan.
