Canadian Overseas Army Established

Formation of a Canadian First Army Headquarters in the United Kingdom was announced recently, and its commander, Lt.-Gen. A. G. L. McNaughton, declared it would provide a Canadian organ-"competent to undertake ization the planning for eventual offenve operations on the Continent."
"It will keep the closest liaison

with British organizations set up for similar purposes," Gen. Mc-Naughton said in a statement from the new headquarters which was opened in Southern England.

He said formation of the First Canadian Army "is a clear recog-nition that the war can only be won by attack-aimed at the heart of Germany."

(A simultaneous Ottawa announcement on the setting up of Army organization in Canada's military history said: "The estab-lishment of the First Canadian Army overseas will create a thoroughly modern, self-contained and hard-hitting fighting force capable of operating in any theatre of war. It is particularly strong in armored fighting power.")

What Science Is Doing

Hungry people live longest—if the are not too hungry, Edwin Teale writes in Popular Science Monthly. A diet that contains all essentials in reduced quanti-ties is, next to long-lived ancestors, the greatest aid to longer-ity. This is the conclusion of eight years of pioneer experi-ments with more than 2,500 white rats by Dr. Clive M. McCay, working under a grant of the Rocke feller Foundation at Cornell Uni-

White rats react to diet in the same manner as humans. Roughly ten days in the life of a rat is equal to one year in the life of a man. All the rats were fed a basal diet, but those receiving only half rations lived longest. The reduced diet slowed down bodily activities. There were fewer white corpuscles in the blood stream, and the animals hearts beat only three hundred times a minute instead of the four hundred beats of the well-fed

Living more slowly, saving energy, they lived longer. The Me-thuselah of the laboratory was an underfed rodent with a life span of 1,430 days—proportion-

ately 143 years for a man.

To find if excess in one kind of food shortened life more than excess in other kinds, Dr. McCay fed one group of middle-age rats excess sugar, another starch, a excess sugar, another starch, a third whole-milk powder, and a fourth liver. All four over-fed groups lived approximately the same length of time. All died much sooner than they would have if they had continued on short rations. Over eating, no matter what, works against a long

Dr. McCay could find no "long-evity foods". Nor could he find that a high protein diet shortened the span of life. He thus sums up his findings: "Eat what you ought to eat first; then eat what you want to eat-but not too much of it."

Need 20,000 Pupils For Ontario Farms

Twenty thousand Ontario sec ondary school students will be needed to work on farms in the holiday season, A. McLaren, Farm Service Force Director, said re-

Students from twelve years of age up are being registered for farm help, he said. Camps were being established for girls from sixteen to nineteen who will be paid a minimum of 22½ cents an hour for farm work and in such areas as the Niagara Peninsula where piece work prevails the minimum must come up to this hourly rate.

Boys would be paid \$20 for

the first month they work if they are inexperienced and \$25 if they worked on farms last year. For the remainder of their employment, their salary will be settled between themselves and their employers. Mr. MacLaren said.

Store Up Steam In Accumulators

British War Factories Have Saved Thousands of Tons of Fuel

Thousands of tons of fuel have been saved in Britain's war factories by storing steam in accumulators during air raids. Although factories do not shut down merely on getting the "alert." they have to do so when the roof snotters signal that the raiders are over-But instead of the boilers blow-

ing off their steam into the air when work stops, the steam is generated into the accumulators stored, to be used when the raiders have passed. More than a thousand of these

accumulators have now been installed in iron and steel works. sugar refineries, breweries, dair-les, dyeworks and laundries. All act on the same principle—the storage of energy during off-peakload periods, and the calling into action of this steam when production requires it.

In one sugar refinery the instal-lation of a steam accumulator raised production by 12 per cent, and lowered coal consumption by about 7 per cent. In a dairy the time taken to produce condensed

Nazis Mobilizing Airborne Troops

Signs Point To Preparations For Early Invasion of England

The German high command is preparing to "sacrifice 200,000 airborne troops in a spring smash against British power stations and gasoline dumps, a responsible Lon-don observer said recently.

"It will not be the sort of in vasion the public has learned to expect," he added. "Hitler will see to that. He is still a smart fellow."

If such a force comparatively

small for an invasion, were to damage vital centres such as power plants and gasoline depots this informant declared, the German high command would feel the invest ment in men, transport planes and gliders well worth while.

"To win this war, Hitler must

stop British supplies from reach-ing Russia and get the hard-hitting British blitzes off his back' he continued. "The surest gamble for him now is an airborne invasion." Information reaching London from the continent supported the

U. S. Armed Forces **Need More Doctors**

The need for doctors, dentists. pharmacists and engineers is much greater than the supply, according to Harlow J. Heneman, director of the University of Michigan War Board.

The armed forces and war industries of the United States need 25,000 doctors, 10,000 dentists, 4,000 pharmacists and 100 .engineers immediately, he said.

Only 5,100 doctors, 1,600 dentists, 1,500 pharmacists and between 13,000 and 16,000 engineers will graduate this year from American colleges and univer-
