Council met on the above date for the transaction of general business with all members of Council present and Wilbert Sutcliffe, Reeve, presiding.

Minutes of previous meeting were read and confirmed. Correspondence was read as follows: Dept. of Highways, re road expenditure; County Engineer, re snow plowing; Dept. of Public Welfare, re relief subsidy.

Relief accounts to the total of \$61.54, were received and passed. Dixon - Howey—That the Treasurer receive the sum of \$6.79 from the Township of Euphrasia, re relief to W. Woods for January 1942.—Carried.

Buchanan - Howey—That Treasurer receive \$10.00 from East 20 Sideroad Snow Club for snow-plowing.—Carried.

Beirnes - Dixon—That the Treasurer receive \$17.00 from West 30 Sideroad Snow Club, payment for opening road.—Carried.

Buchanan - Beirnes—That the Treasurer receive the sum of \$40.01 from the Dept. of Public Welfare, subsidy on relief expenditure.—Carried.

Buchanan - Dixon—That the Treasurer receive \$5.00 from Wm. Erwin to apply on snow-plowing portion of 30 sideroad E.T.S.R.—Carried.

Beirnes - Buchanan—That Financial Statement, amounting to \$336.13, be passed and the Treasurer issue cheques for the same.—Carried.

Buchanan - Beirnes—That Road Superintendent's Statement No. 4, amounting to \$119.30 be passed and the Treasurer issue cheques for the same.—Carried.

Council then adjourned until Tuesday, May 5th, at 7 p.m., Day-light Saving Time.

Beirnes - Buchanan—That we insure township roads with the A. E. Wilson Co., Ltd., to the extent of \$5000.00 for one person and a limit of \$10,000 for any one accident to a number of persons and \$1,000.00, property damage in any one accident. Premium \$153.—Carried.

Buchanan - Beirnes—That Road Superintendent's Pay Roll No. 5, amounting to \$284.20 be passed and the Treasurer issue cheques for the same.—Carried.

Buchanan - Beirnes—That Financial Statement No. 5, amounting to \$267.84 be passed and Treasurer issue cheques for the same.—Carried.

Council then adjourned until Tuesday, June 2nd, at 7 p.m., then to meet as a Court of Revision.

Wool tied with binder twine is subject to a deduction of 1c a lb. from above prices. The above prices are what is to be paid to the Grower so bring along your wool.
