We will advance you 25c a lb. as soon as it is weighed up, and the balance of the final payment will be made to you direct from the Government Wool Board.

The prices that you will receive, as set by the Wool Board, are as follows:—

Grade Fine and 1/2 Blood 23c	Rejects or Defective Wool
Southdown 31c	Grey and Black 24c
Military Style 30c	Chaffy and Burry 21c
Felting Style 33c	Cotted Fleece 25c
Ordinary Style Short Staple 30c	Wool Tags 7c

Wool tied with binder twine is subject to a deduction of 1c a lb. from above prices.

The above prices are what is to be paid to the Grower so bring along your wool. We are glad to be able to offer you this service. Under present arrangements you will receive prompt returns, which means that you will receive all your money in not more than 30 days.
