### Confirmation Service

In Christ Church, Markdale, on Monday evening, June 15, Bishop Seager confirmed fifteen young people with eight of Markdale congregation and six from Berkeley being presented by the Rector, Rev. C. O. Pherrill, and one from the Sheburne parish presented by Rev. J. H. Pogson. There was a large attendance, the service was impressive, and the Bishop's sermon timely and helpful. Taking as his text Matt. 26: 24, "If any man will come after me, let him deny himself, and take up his cross and follow me." His Lordship said that self-sacrifice and self-discipline are not, as some wrongly suppose, peculiar to Christianity, for they are an inseparable characteristic of life as we have to live it. No achievement and no enjoyment that are really worth while can be won except through self-restraint and sustained and arduous effort. From suffering and sacrifice even the wicked cannot escape. It is a mistaken idea, therefore, to suppose that the ordeal through which mankind is now passing is a brief interlude in a life allegedly intended purely for human joy and self-gratification. The increasing hardship which we are enduring is to bring people to their senses, for, although the free nations have a contribution to make to the world which can come from no other source, they have been so selfish and wicked that this great world-wide upheaval is utilized by God as a much needed discipline. The Bishop concluded by urging the candidates to get in line with this law of self-denial, because only by his self-denying life and sacrificial life could Christ bring to mankind salvation, new life, progress and glory, and only by the sacrifice of his followers can the full measure of self-denial required for the fulfilment of the divine purpose in this world be made up.

There are two other interesting events in Rotary this month which we would draw to your attention. On Sunday evening, June 21st, Tom Warren of Wolverhampton, England, First Vice-President of Rotary International, will address the Rotary convention. His address will be broadcast on the national network of the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation from 9 p.m. to 9.30 p.m. (E.D.S.T.).

On Thursday, June 25th, Carlos P. Romulo, past vice-president of Rotary International will address the 33rd annual Rotary convention in Toronto, Canada, by radio from Australia. His talk will be carried by the national network of the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation from 5.30 p.m. to 5.45 p.m. (E.D.S.T.).

Rotarian Romulo is a lieutenant colonel on the staff of General Douglas MacArthur in Australia, and was one of the last officers to leave Bataan Peninsula in the Philippines for Australia. In his address to the Rotary convention, he will include a personal message from General MacArthur. Colonel Romulo was publisher of a chain of newspapers in the Philippines and recently was awarded one of the 1942 Pulitzer prizes. A close friend and adviser of President Quezon of the Philippines, he has been a member of several Philippine Independence Missions to the United States.

### Sunday Train Out

Owing to the fact that there appears to be little possibility of securing a Sunday evening train out of Owen Sound on the C.P.R. at the present time, Owen Sound Board of Trade decided on Wednesday evening to write the Toronto Transportation Commission, and ask for a Sunday evening bus directly from Owen Sound to Toronto, via Highway 10. There is an existing bus service from Toronto to Sheburne. The Board will request that this service be extended to Owen Sound. The Board has been advised by officials of the Canadian Pacific that there was no hope of establishing Sunday evening train service at the present time. The reasons given are the added expense; lack of extra equipment, and lack of trained operating personnel. The movement of troops and the generally increased tempo of railway business as a result of the war, have brought every available piece of equipment into use.—Owen Sound Daily Sun Times.

### Miss Nellie Armstrong

The funeral of the late Teressa Ellen (Nellie) Armstrong, who passed away on Wednesday evening last, June 16th, was held on Friday, June 19th, from the home of her brother, Mr. C. E. Armstrong, Wellington Street, Markdale, with service in Annesley United Church. The service was conducted by the pastor, Rev. S. E. Annis. The pallbearers were Dr. L. G. Campbell, Messrs. Alex. Acheson, Jack Perkins, W. D. Mercer, Geo. Alton and Wilson Henry. Interment was made in Markdale Cemetery.

The late Miss Armstrong was born in Markdale in 1868, a daughter of the late William and Margaret Armstrong, and had resided in the village all her life, with the exception of the years when she was engaged as a milliner. In her younger days Miss Armstrong had been active in the church and Sunday School work in the Methodist Church but due to failing health for a number of years she had been confined to the house and her own neighborhood. The late Miss Armstrong is survived by one brother, Charles E. Armstrong, in Markdale, the other members of the family having predeceased her. There are also a number of nieces and nephews who mourn her passing.

### Alexander Lucas Dies

(Vancouver Province)

A link with the pioneering and construction eras of Eastern and Western Canada was severed with the passing Monday, June 8th, of Alexander Lucas, 91, of 195 West Eighteenth. Mr. Lucas was born in Brooke Township, Lambton County, where his grandfather was the first recorded white settler. He had lived in the collection as a farmer's boy of the big picnic held to celebrate the centennial of the Dominion.

As a young man he and his brothers entered the business of private banking in 1886 with offices at Kirkdale and Dundalk. He was reeve of the Village of Alvinston from 1880 until 1884 and unsuccessfully contested the Dominion constituency of East Lambton against the Hon. Peter Graham.

In 1886 he moved his family to Calgary, bringing the first trainload of cattle ever shipped over the north shore line of the C.P.R. In partnership with the late Sir James Loughhead, and Peter McCarthy, K.C., he purchased the Calgary Herald from the late Judge Cayley and managed it for a considerable time.

He organized the Calgary Board of Trade, and was its first president from 1892 to 1894. He was elected first mayor of the city upon its incorporation in 1894. He contested Calgary West against the late Hon. A. L. Sifton in 1891, and both were defeated by an Independent Conservative, Oswald Oritchley, by three votes.

The late Mr. Lucas came to British Columbia in 1897 and was provincial organizer for the Conservative party when party lines were established prior to the elections of 1903. Mining recorder and later provincial assessor for Kootenay, he retired from government service in 1910 and engaged in farming near Agassiz. He was elected to the Legislature for Yale, holding the seat from 1910 to 1916.

Mr. Lucas made a long study of government credits to be extended to those engaged in the farming industry and in 1913 went as a commissioner of the Provincial Government to Australia and New Zealand to investigate rural credit systems in effect in those dominions. Sir Richard McBride went out of office before the system could be inaugurated in British Columbia.

For the past 20 years he has been living in retirement in Vancouver. Mrs. Lucas predeceased him in 1922 and his eldest son, the late Mr. Justice Lucas, in 1935. He is survived by one son, Edward Alexander, seven grandchildren and two great grandchildren and by three sisters, Mrs. Angus Macpherson and Mrs. J. F. Parke of Toronto, and Mrs. Walter Turner of Long Beach, California. His four brothers, including the Hon. I. B. Lucas, K.C., attorney-general of Ontario during the Whitney government, all predeceased him.

The funeral will take place on Thursday and will be conducted privately at the chapel of Harron Bros., Ltd.
