APPLICATION CARDS FOR COUPON RATIONING OF SUGAR

will be mailed next week to every Household in Canada

Canadians will be required to register so that ration cards, good for the 10 week period, commencing July 1st, may be issued immediately. At the end of that period o ration book, good for six months, will be issued.

HOW TO REGISTER Residents in Urban Areas not served by Letter Carrier, and Residents in

Application cards will be distributed to all house polders through the post offices on or before Tues-lay, June 23rd. Additional cards will also be deered for every person resident in the house who bears a different last name from the head of he household. If needed, extra cards may be secured from local post offices.

These application cards should be filled out immediately and dropped in the nearest mail box or post office. A pamphlet giving complete instructions will be delivered with each card. As soon as your name is duly registered at headquarters, ration cards, good for a ten-week period, will be mailed to you—one ration card for each person in your home. These will be for sugar only. 
