After the words of welcome by the pastor, Rev. Father Nolan, the Bishop delivered an eloquent sermon. His Excellency said in part: "I am sure it is a great pleasure for each and everyone of us to visit here in Glenelg. The history of this church is associated with the early history of this Hamilton Diocese. I hope you will always be loyal and devoted to the Church of God and always endeavour to keep the faith alive in this part of the Diocese."

Confirmation is a sacrament, which our Catechism teaches, makes us strong and perfect Christians. We should ask of the Holy Ghost that grace will come to us in wisdom and counsel and that we may be strengthened in our Holy Faith."

His Excellency then referred to the sermon preached on June 9th last by His Holiness Pope Pius XII to a group of Cardinals, Bishops and Priests who gathered together to celebrate the Patronal Feast of the Pope—St. Eugenius.

Reference was made to the persecution suffered by the early church and how the early Christians remained faithful to God through the strength that they received by the frequent reception of Holy Communion and by their fidelity to daily prayer.

Immediately following the Confirmation the Bishop had the children pledge themselves to the following: 1. That you will with the help of God and His Blessed Mother be ever loyal to Holy Mother Church and to your King and Country.

2. That you will be faithful in daily prayers. 3. That you will receive the Sacrament of Holy Eucharist every day if possible. 4. That you will abstain from all intoxicating liquors until the age of 21 years.

The Bishop was then the Celebrant of Benediction, assisted by Rev. Father Murray, C.S.B.-P.P., of Owen Sound, as Deacon and Rev. Father Leavy, P.P., Riversdale, Ont. as Subdeacon. The other visiting Clergy were: Rev. Fathers Simpson, P.P., Walkerton; Ryan, P.P., Durham; Kelly, P.P., of Chesley; Brick, P.P., of Carleton Place and Rev. Father O'Brien, Bishop's Secretary, Hamilton.

W. C. T. U. Convention

The forty-eighth annual convention of the Grey and Dufferin W.C.T.U. was held Wednesday, June 17, in the W.C.T.U. hall, with Mrs. Alice Clement, a member of the Town Council of Meaford, presiding.

The morning session opened with the Crusade hymn and the devotion- al period was taken by Mrs. L. B. Danard. She said, "Our standard should be the Word of God and that we should cultivate the spirit of prayer."

Mrs. Danard presented the treasurer's report, showing money raised for temperance education and missions, \$32.00 was forwarded to the "Home Centre" fund. This is a permanent building being erected at Petawawa camp by the Dominion W.C.T.U. for the soldiers' and Air-men's Christian Association. It is a place where Christian fellowship, leadership and Bible study is given. There are seven of these places in Canada.

Mrs. P. A. Brown conducted the Memorial service, naming those from the three Unions who have passed on during the year. Mrs. Jas. Howey and Miss Winnifred Doyle of Owen Sound and Mrs. H. Down of Plesherton, a member of the Markdale Union. Reference was made of Mrs. Down who took an active part in the temperance cause.

Mrs. R. E. Brown offered the noon-day prayer. A delicious picnic lunch was served by the ladies of the Owen Sound Union, followed by a gracious welcome to the delegates by Miss Grace Leffard, president of the Owen Sound Union. She stressed the importance of the teaching of temperance principles in the schools and Sunday Schools.

The Markdale Union had charge of the devotional period in the afternoon with a message from Mrs. Stobbie which was based on the "I am" presenting the person of God, the promised One, "I am the Son of God"; "I am the light of the world"; "I am the way, the truth and the life"; "I am Alpha and Omega"; "I am alive forever more".

The Superintendent of each department gave a synopsis of the work in her department. A well rendered solo was given by Mrs. C. C. Middlebro, a pageant was presented by sixteen members of the Meaford Union, showing the work of the W.C.T.U. and some of the things it has accomplished in the different countries of the world. Mrs. Clement had assembled the material for the pageant and arranged the script for the speaking parts.

The guest speaker was Rev. William Howey. He expressed the conviction that there needs to be a stirring and an awakening of the church members, politicians and citizens alike to the realization of the appalling conditions as a result of the liquor traffic. Mr. Howey referred to Canada's liquor bill as twice as great as her allocation to education. He listed the waste of food materials in the making of wine and told of the amount of war supplies and machinery that could be bought with the money spent on the making of liquor.

Reports from the committees were presented and Mrs. Alice Clement was re-elected County President. The convention will be held in Meaford next year. Mrs. Clement, in her closing address, urged that we go forward in our work and go willingly.

After singing the National Anthem Rev. Wm. Howey pronounced the benediction.
