Last week we published the general results of the recent High School Entrance examinations and stated that Stanley Brodie of Markdale Public School had won the Dr. Jamieson Gold Medal. This medal is awarded annually by Hon. Dr. Jamieson of Durham to the Entrance pupil receiving the highest number of marks on the H. S. Entrance examinations in South Grey. Stanley not only heads the inspectorate of 365 candidates, for this famous prize but took one of the highest marks that has ever been obtained in South Grey—93 per cent. of the total mark. On very few occasions has a boy won this honour.

Stanley Brodie, who will be 14 years of age this month, is the eldest child of Mr. and Mrs. Victor Brodie of the townline of Artemesia and Euphrasia. He secured all his education in Markdale and stayed during the week with his grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. E. N. Brodie and his aunt, Miss Della Brodie. His teachers have been Miss Marjorie Mann, the late Miss Willa Patterson, Mrs. A. E. Hunt, (nee Miss Freda Eagles), Miss Mamie McLoughry and for the past two years, Principal, W. J. Messenger, while he has been in Grades VII and VIII.

Stanley received full marks on the spelling paper on the examination and was highest in the inspectorate in literature and tied with another pupil for the highest marks in mathematics. Not only does he excel in the subjects of the H. S. Entrance but he is equally proficient in all subjects on the Course of Study, leading his class in the term reports. In Manual Training he shows special talent with the result that the articles made by him show great care and skill. He is an incessant reader, thereby having a broad and general knowledge for a boy of his age. Thorough application to school and home lessons along with regular and punctual attendance have brought him his success.

All his time is not taken up with books, as sports hold a special interest for him, baseball and hockey being the favourites. He was a member of the school teams in each of the above games and played on the Markdale Midget hockey team last winter.

Stanley is a regular attendant at the Ebenezer United Church Sunday School and church services and at Annesley United when in Markdale, where he belonged to the Trail Rangers. He is of a bright happy disposition, courteous and mannerly to all and is a general favourite with his teachers and schoolmates.

This is the fifth time the distinction of having a pupil win this coveted honour has come to Markdale school, all since Mr. W. J. Messenger has been principal and for five other years a pupil of this school was a close second for the medal. Those having won this honour from Markdale in the past were: Jean Stewart, Maxine Lyons, Ruth Armstrong and Dorothy Boyd, the latter winning with a percentage of 95.6, the highest ever obtained in Grey County and possibly but rarely exceeded in Ontario.

## Agricultural Society Meets Fair On Sept. 16 and 17
