Young People's Rally

On June 30th and July 1st a Young People's Rally was held in Meaford under the auspices of the Young People of the Gospel Workers' Church.

Rev. Walter S. Crone of Niagara Falls who was the guest speaker, gave four really soul-stirring messages from the Word of God. Rev. James Trew, pastor of the Meaford Church, spoke at the opening meeting of the Rally on Tuesday morning.

Taking Joshua III: 5, as his text he spoke of the necessity of the sanctified heart in order that God might do wondrous things for us. In the afternoon meeting Rev. Walter S. Crone spoke on "God's Blue-print for my Life". He emphasized the importance of the church depending on the Spirit of God rather than its own organization. Rev. Crone was speaker at the evening meeting also.

Using the text John VIII: 38, "He that believeth in Me, out from within him shall flow rivers of living water," he brought a most excellent message for both young and old, stressing the fact that it is not talent, education or circumstances which make a dynamic Christian, but it is faith in God.

The dismissing of the evening meeting by Rev. Trew brought to a close the first day of the Rally, and it was felt by all to have been a day of real spiritual blessing. Over 100 were in attendance at the afternoon and evening meetings.

The second day of the Rally opened with the morning meeting for which Miss Ila Dennet of Markdale was the speaker. Her subject was "Life, Warfare and Victory," and her theme could be expressed as "If we want to be a success we must take Jesus with us." At the afternoon meeting Rev. Crone again was the speaker, speaking from the miraculous feeding of the multitude recorded in the 6th chapter of St. John's Gospel. His subject was "The Secret of Blessing Others," and he pointed out that our success in this does not depend on the quantity of the material we have but on our bringing what we have to Jesus. He differentiated between being consecrated to usefulness and consecrated to God. The night meeting was also featured by an excellent message by Rev. Crone based on Pilate's question, "What then shall I do with Jesus?" Thus was brought to its close a two-day rally which was marked throughout by real spirituality and soul-stirring messages.

It was found necessary to move from the Gospel Workers' Church to the Town Hall in order to accommodate the crowds in attendance, several car-loads coming from Owen Sound, Chatsworth, Markdale, Shelburne, Faversham, Collingwood, Thornbury and many other points. There was an average attendance over the two days of over 120, with a peak of about 250 at the last meeting.

Great credit for the success of the Rally is due to the excellent instrumental and vocal messages brought by Rev. Harold A. Edwards of Port Erie and for his spirited song-leading, assisted by Wilson McVannell of Shelburne at the piano.

Another feature of the Rally, which held great interest for its more youthful attendants, were the children's meetings. They were very ably conducted by Miss Reta Javens of Owen Sound.
