Dr. Jamieson underwent treat-

the latter part of July and it was thought he would regain his health but for the last two weeks it was known he could never be well again. Pneumonia developed a few days before his death. He leaves an only son, Dr. Bradshaw Jamieson. An infant son, David Jackson, died at the age of nine months. Two grandsons. Lieut. Bowman Jamieson and P.O. Frederick Starr Jamieson are in England. There are two granddaughters. Miss I sabella Jamieson in Toronto and Nursing Sister F. Louise Jamieson in Johannesburg, South Africa. Joseph Bradshaw. brother-in-law, who made his home at Bon Accord, is also left to mourn. The death of Alex. Jamieson, who lived at Mount Forest, bereft him of his only brother and one sister, Mrs. (Rev.) Martin, also predeceased McFadden of Orillia.

Dr. Jamieson was born in Puslinch township near Guelph in 1856 with Rev. Norman Caswell in charge and was the son of William and Ann Jameson who came from Aberdeen. Scotland. The family moved to Mount Forest, when he was about 5 years of age. He attended school till about 13 years of age, then worked in the Examiner Printing office for 5 years and won the championship of Canada as the fastest typesetter. He then attended Toronto University and graduated in Medicine in 1878. He is the last of that graduating class. Dr. Jamieson married Isabella Bradshaw of Toronto 59 years ago, and they came to Durham where he practised medicine with the greatest success It is said he never failed to get a case-and during the last war when the flu epidemic was raging he made as many as 100 calls a day. When first he began his practice there was no doctor for many miles round and he built a special telephone line to Dornoch and to Aberdeen in 1890.

Dr. Jamieson was reeve of Dur ham in 1885-86 and was elected to the Provincial Parliament in 1898. where he was member for 25 years. He was speaker of the House from 1914 to 1919-and retired in 1926. He was made chairman of the Mother's Allowance Board in 1927 and when the Old Age Pension Act was adopted he was also chairman of that Board. Dr. and Mrs. Jamieson were guests at the dinner at Hart House in honour of the King and Queen.

Deforest Field

The death occurred in the Owen Sound hospital on Sunday of Deforest Field of Markdale. The deceased, who had been ill was 78 years of age.

The late Mr. Field was born and grew to manhood in Osprey Township. He engaged in active farming all his life until seven or eight years ago.

His wife and two children predeceased him. One daughter, Mrs. Mitchell Harvey of Cherry Grove survives.

The funeral took place from the Oliver Funeral Chapel on Tuesday to Markdale Cemetery. Rev. Nor man Caswell had charge of the services. The pallbearers were Messrs. R. Boyce, W. A. Dickie, R. Bowler
